

JAP OFFICER SAYS U. S. GREAT NATION

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 8 (AP)—"America is the greatest country on earth. Tell my brothers to fight for her with all their heart."

Strange words, those, when spoken by a Japanese army officer, but that's what one of them told Reiman Morin, Associated Press foreign service correspondent recently returned after months of internment in Saigon, Indo-China.

Morin, on an NBC broadcast last night, related how he was hailed before Japanese officers who accused him of being an American spy. Denying the accusations, the writer then was ushered into a room occupied only by a Japanese intelligence officer who spoke good English and said he was born and reared in Santa Barbara, Calif.

"I have two brothers in the American army," the Jap told Morin. "Please look them up and tell them America is the greatest country on earth. Tell them to be loyal. Tell them to fight with all their heart."

Morin didn't reveal the names of the brothers for obvious reasons. He learned, however, they were no longer in the United States army.

UW FINDS ANGLERS WORK ON CAMPUS

SEATTLE, Oct. 8 (AP)—The piscatorial fruits of 12 years of scientific experimentation provided the bill of fare for some Seattle home this week and University of Washington officials have been forced to take extraordinary precautions to prevent a repetition of the tragedy.

Since 1930 the University School of Fisheries (no pun) has worked at developing a super-mammoth variety of Rainbow trout that grows as fast in two years as other trout grow in four and can convert natural fish food into more flesh than any other variety.

Added to these two desirable characteristics is a reproductive rate that exceeds the imagination.

Today the project is an off-campus affair.

Some night during the week someone scaled a high fence and dipped up 35 of the fish from their 3-foot-deep campus ponds—leaving only 41 behind.

Yesterday, to prevent further unnatural decimation of the fishes' ranks Prof. Lauren R. Donaldson bundled the remaining beauties into tanks and shipped them off to some secret hiding grounds.
