DEPUTIES WILL ENFORCE GAME LAWS, REPORT

TULELAKE—John C. Sharp, sheriff of Modoc county, advised the farm center by letter that all civilian defense deputies will be deputized as law enforcement officials during the migratory water fowl hunting season with permission to act in event of shooting violations. Six or eight local men will wear the cloak of authority. The announcement was made at this week's meeting of the center which honored 4-H boys and girls as special guests.

Pete Smelcer, county road supervisor of the fifth district in Modoc county advised that the scarcity of rubber, equipment and manpower will hold up the road improvement program in all parts of the county for the duration but that as much as possible will be done for roads in the Tulelake area.
