mission's action and hunting become legal immediately.

This however applies only to seasons which normally would be open now and does not alter opening and closing dates.

Deer hunting is legal as result of the action, but antelope shooting in south central Oregon, which was halted by the ban, may not be resumed. The season ended during the ban, Wire said, and the commission has no authority to extend it.

Deer hunting will end October 31, as regularly scheduled, Wire continued.

All fishing which normally would be permitted at this time is open again.

The action followed conferences by the game commission with state and U. S. forestry men who pointed out that conditions in the forests are much improved. There are a few closed areas in slash lands. Hunters desiring to hunt in areas containing slash must first ascertain whether their particular district is closed. Wire said the areas comprised only a few thousand acres and were unimportant in size.

The action does not advance duck or upland bird seasons.

The migratory bird season opens in Oregon on October 15, upland bird shooting in western Oregon on October 17, in most of eastern Oregon, October 15.

The fire in the Fremont forest started near Lost river, jumped the river and burned into slash land north of Bonanza, according to word received by the Klamath Forest Protective association, which was helping in the effort to control the blaze. It had advanced five or six miles at mid-afternoon.

A fire which started Friday noon in the Shasta forest country of northern California was apparently making little headway and may be controlled. It sent up volumes of smoke Friday afternoon, after starting in the Grass lake district near the Weed-Klamath Falls highway. KFFPA officials called atten-

to \$500 for single persons and from \$1500 to \$1200 for married persons. The house left the credit for dependents at \$400 but the senate cut this to \$300, adding, however, a credit for extraordinary medical expenses.

Most of the increased revenue of the senate bill came from addition to the measure of a 5 per cent tax on individual gross income above \$624 yearly, with post-war debate provisions.

The senate voted to fix the combined rate of normal and surtax charges against corporations at 40 per cent, instead of the 45 per cent previously voted by the house and the 31 per cent under present law. It agreed with house action in raising excess profits taxes to 90 per cent from the present range of 35 to 60 per cent, but inserted a 10 per cent post-war rebate provision.

The government said an unauthorized order had been issued before the Dieppe raid directing that the hands of German prisoners be bound "to prevent them from destroying papers" but that no prisoners were so treated and the order later was countermanded.

LONG DISTANCE CALLS RESTRICTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The board of war communications Friday decreed that beginning November 1, long distance telephone calls dealing with the war effort or other phases of public security shall have the right-of-way over all others.

Number one priority was given to these specific purposes: Arrangements for moving armed forces during combat operations, extremely urgent orders to armed forces, immediate dangers due to the presence of the enemy, and to calls respecting hurricane, flood, earthquake or other disaster materially affecting the war effort or public security.

The board assigned number two priority to all other types of calls "which require immediate completion for the national defense and security, the successful conduct of the war, or to safeguard life or property."

SUB MENACE

A UNITED NATIONS BASE IN WEST AFRICA, Oct. 10 (AP)—Small, new model German U-boats, fought to a standstill in the North Atlantic, are striking renewed blows against allied shipping off the bulge of West Africa, apparently carrying out plans laid years in advance and with the help of pro-Nazi countries which are technically neutral.

emy positions at Buka island, Gizo island and Rekata bay, all in the northwestern Solomons.

Five Ships Hit
The task force, the navy had reported on Thursday, damaged five enemy ships of a concentration at Shortland island in the Solomons.

Coordinated army-navy marine corps action, it was disclosed today, resulted in damage to several planes at Buka and in destruction of three seaplanes and a small launch as well as damage to reach installations at Rekata bay. Results at Gizo were not observed.

Recounting the actions in which the Japanese destroyers and the cruiser were successfully attacked, the navy's communique said that on the night of October 5-6, a force of six enemy destroyers was attempting to assist enemy landing operations at the northwestern end of Guadalcanal island. These ships had

been sighted by American planes. Under cover of darkness, navy and marine corps dive-bombers and torpedo planes made their attacks, sinking one destroyer and damaging another.

GENERAL MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Oct. 10 (AP)—General Douglas MacArthur's airmen lashed out last night at the Japanese supply base at Rabaul, New Britain, spreading 60 tons of explosive and incendiary bombs among enemy supply dumps, barracks and jetties in the largest single air raid yet attempted in the southwest Pacific by allied heavy bombers.

The raid started fires that were visible for 80 miles and underlined the statement of Navy Secretary Knox yesterday that the United States was on the offensive in the Pacific.

DEFERMENT IS REQUESTED FOR DAIRY WORKERS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—Fifteen farm state senators petitioned Selective Service Director Hershey today to freeze dairy and livestock workers on the farms for the next three months to prevent "irreparable injury" to food production while a general manpower control program is worked out.

"We are convinced that specific action to halt the continuing drain of manpower from our livestock and dairy farms cannot be delayed longer without seriously impairing the whole war effort," they declared in a letter circulated by Senators Ball (R-Minn.) and Brown (D-Mich.).

"The number of farm auctions is growing rapidly and hundreds of fine dairy herds are being sold or slaughtered because the owners cannot hold the help essential to continued operation. Unless the trend is halted immediately, a crippling reduction in food production will occur." The census bureau reported last night that agricultural em-

ployment had declined to, 10, 200,000 persons, a drop of 1, 000,000 between August and September, and Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the war production board declared the time was rapidly approaching when the government must decide at what point the limit will be reached in building up the armed forces.

Specifically, the 15 senators asked General Hershey to direct all local selective service boards to defer for at least 90 days all men engaged in either dairy or livestock production on farms, "such deferment to be cancelled immediately and the men ordered to report for induction if they leave their farm production jobs."

In addition to Ball and Brown, the signers included Senators McNary (R-Ore.), Thomas (R-Idaho) and Burton (R-Idaho).
