

Vote Campaign Is Aim of League

Women Voters Plan Drive and Candidates Meetings for November Program.

Plans for a sweeping "get-out-to-vote" campaign to be carried on under the sponsorship of the Klamath County League of Women Voters were discussed and completed Friday afternoon at a meeting of the board of directors held at the home of the League president, Mrs. Everett R. Dennis.

Candidates meetings will be held by the League on Monday evening, October the nineteenth, and on Monday afternoon, November the second. State measures to appear upon the ballot at the November 3 election will also be presented and discussed by able speakers at both of these meetings to which all men, as well as women, are cordially invited. The meetings will be held in the small club room of the city library.

Mrs. Nelson Reed presented an interesting and diverting program on the city charter on Monday afternoon, October the fifth.

The new stream-lined and simplified city charter which was recently drawn up by a capable committee, of which Mrs. Reed was the only woman member, was read in part at the meeting. Its advantages over the out-moded charter under which the city now operates, and which was drawn up in 1913, were apparent.

One of the sections of the old charter which caused much amusement at the meeting, was read by Mrs. Reed as follows: The council is told "To regulate public dance halls and public dancing and skating rinks; and to prohibit any person or persons to engage in any immoral dance or dances commonly known or termed or designated as the Turkey trot; Rag Dance; Moonlight Waltz; Dip; Slide-over-the-Wave; Heads Together; The Walk Back; The Walk Dance; The Rough Dance; The Bunnie Hug; or dances of like character and provide by penalty for the punishment of any owner of the premises, proprietor or agent permitting the same in or about the premises wherein the same may be conducted; and to provide by penalty for the punishment of persons engaging in such dances."

Another of the antiquated provisions of the present charter reads: "The council is to protect the public from injury by run-aways, by punishing persons who leave horses or other animals in the streets without being fastened; To provide the place or the manner in which horses or carriages standing upon the public streets, thoroughfares or in public places should be fastened and secured."

Perhaps though, on second thought, this provision is not as funny as it sounds, and it may be wise to incorporate it in the new charter if the tire and gasoline situation becomes much more acute.

According to word received here by Mrs. Dennis, the national league president, Miss Marguerite Wells, will be heard in a radio address on Sunday morning, October 12, at 7:45 o'clock, over KGW and all Red Network stations of the National Broadcasting company. This is the "Commando Mary" program, and Miss Wells will be interviewed by Ernest Barlow, the program emanating from New York. Her subject will be "How To Get the Best Congress."

All members of the Klamath County league are urged to tune in on the national president's talk.
