Women Needed in Red Cross Program of Klamath County

Women who have devoted many hours to Red Cross work are interested to learn that Red Cross headquarters have been moved from the armory to 418 Main street. Any woman willing to give her time to this work is more than welcome to do so.

In their new location the work can be conducted to much better advantage as the rooms are spacious and well lighted and the many activities of the Red Cross will be under one roof, with the single exception of the surgical dressings work. The rooms are now being renovated and arranged and when this is completed an "open house" will be held so that the people of Klamath Falls may see how this vital work is being carried on.

There is urgent need for workers at this time as the stocks in the Red Cross warehouses all over the country have been depleted by recent heavy shipments to England, Australia, China and Russia—in fact, everywhere where the United Nations are fighting. The local chapter recently sent 500 pounds of garments and knitted goods to the warehouse at Ogden, Utah, for which there was immediate need.

The new location of the Red Cross quarters are so convenient that it is hoped a great many workers will be able to give some time weekly to this work for our boys in the service.
