Klamath Falls Club Enjoys Program Monday Eve Presented at Weekly Dinner

The aim of National Business Women's week in 1942 is to interpret the contribution which Business and Professional women are making and may make to the war effort in all fields of democratic life—economical, political, educational, cultural, and social welfare. Today, as trained women, they recognize that they have their special responsibilities to utilize and make available their skills at maximum capacity.

As a prelude to the opening of National Business Women's week, the local BPW club listened to a carefully picked group of local leaders at the regular dinner meeting Monday evening.

Mitchell Tillotson, speaking from the economist's point of view defined inflation, pointing out the necessity of war bond purchases to prevent disastrous economic disturbances. "Though we may be broke after the war," he said, "the picture is not as black as it is painted. The American people will go to work to pay their debt."

Outlining one of the most exacting of local jobs, Effie Garcelon described the war price and rationing set up, which consists of four paid clerks, augmented by a score of volunteer workers who offer their services during rush periods.

A brief talk on the opening of Fire Prevention week and the necessity in these times for extra care was presented by Keith Ambrose, local fire chief.

"War Stamp Censor," was received by Dorothea Reed, and a tap dance by Betty Clag, and songs by Mrs. Reed, accompanied by Mrs. Don Zumwalt, completed the very interesting program of the evening. 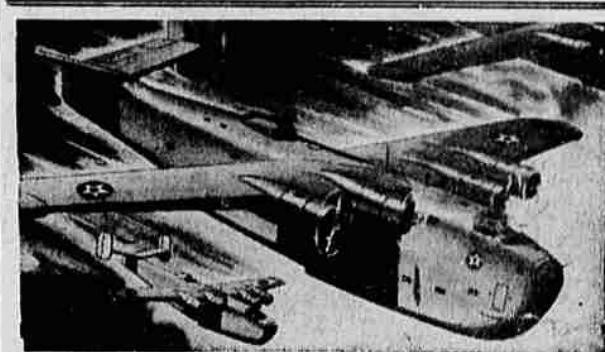
