PELICANS PLASTER ASHLAND, 26-0

Heavy Klamath Eleven Held to 7-0 at Half; Bobbles Prove Costly

ASHLAND, Oct. 10 (Special) Klamath Falls' heavy, hard-charging Pelicans overran an outweighted Ashland high school football team here last night and crunched onward to a 26-0 victory, their fourth straight and first in southern Oregon conference competition.

The inspired Grizzly eleven held the powerful mountaineers to a 7-0 bulge at the half, mainly through alert recovery of a rash of Klamath fumbles. The lone Pelican score came in the second quarter on a two-yard romp by Halfback Baldy Foster

around end. Manager Bernard Vaillancour converted.

Opening phases of the second half struggle found the visitors still checked by the fighting Grizzlies and the Ashlanders even threatening. On passes they floated down to the Klamath 15 but Fullback Don Mast grabbed a short Grizzly aerial in the flat and raced some 80 yards for the unbeaten Klamath's second touchdown. Vaillancour again converted.

Coach Frank Ramsey called his reserves from the bench as the third period died but the youngsters went on to score

twice again to bring the invader total to exactly that of last year when a highly-touted Ashland squad fell before the then-undefeated Pelicans, 26-0, on Modoc field.

A pass to End Rex Young from the 15 gave the crashing Red and White eleven their third score. Vaillancour missed a second attempt after both sides were offside on the first.

The fourth and final touchdown followed shortly thereafter.

The game was halted intermittently as the featherlike Grizzlies took time either to recover or send in substitutes for regu-

lars injured by hard Klamath charges. The Ashlanders appeared to be in poor physical condition even before the game.

Marvin Watson, big Klamath guard, was removed from the game in the second half suffering from a blow on the noggin which temporarily halted him mentally but not physically.

Thrice in the first quarter the Pelicans smashed to scoring territory only to either hobble or lose the ball on downs as the Grizzlies dug in. The Ashland inspiration seemed to die as the second half got well under way, however, and the superior con-

dition of the Klamaths told the story.

Young Elwyn Silva, Klamath junior backfield sensation, handled himself well and reeled off a long run almost good for a score. He was brought down, however, about 20 yards short of the end zone. His repeated fumbles however, detracted from his otherwise semi-glittering performance.

The game was scouted by Medford coaches and players alike. Next week the historic rivals clash in their annual classic on the Black Tornado's field.

Rose Bowl Contest Set By Officials

Game May Not Be Inter-Sectional, May Not Be In Bowl; Service Teams Eyed

PASADENA, Calif., Oct. 10 (AP)—There will be a Rose bowl game come New Year's day. It may not be in the Rose bowl, and possibly it won't be a college inter-sectional contest as in the past, but there will be a Rose bowl game.

The Tournament of Roses association made the announcement late last night after a conference with representatives of the Pacific Coast conference. James K. Ingham, association president, said plans will proceed subject only to approval of the military authorities.

If developments prevent holding the football game in Pasadena's Rose bowl, its historic setting, then it will be moved elsewhere, Ingham declared. This was the case last New Year's day, when Oregon State college and Duke university met at Durham, N. C., after the army refused approval of the Pasadena site.

There was some indication that the game might throw two service elevens against each other for army and navy relief. This was not discussed officially, however, as the issue would have to be decided by a vote of conference members.

The field judge—a big, fat fellow—was carrying a revolver to stop the game at the half. In jumping around on the recovery of a punt, the revolver dropped out of his pocket and was picked up by Chuck Collins, our end.

Too Much Game Is Feared

Izaak Walton Official Says Army Should Hunt

PORTLAND, Oct. 10 (AP)—There will be too much game in America's forests this winter unless soldiers are called upon to reduce deer and elk herds.

So said Kenneth A. Reid, executive secretary of the Izaak Walton League of America, yesterday.

There will be fewer hunters, because so many men are in the armed forces, and he suggested that hunting seasons be extended. If herds still are not reduced, then the soldiers should be called in, Reid told an interviewer.

The hides, hair and meat of the animals could be used in the war effort, he said.

Skiff Signed For 3rd Term By Seattle

SEATTLE, Oct. 10 (AP)—Bill Skiff signed for a third year as manager of the Seattle Pacific Coast league baseball team late yesterday but he left the door open for acceptance of a major league managerial post if it develops.

Emil Sick, president of the club, announced he and Skiff had come to terms after a lengthy conference and said he had agreed the contract would not be binding if the bigger job was offered the little skipper.
