

PLANS MADE FOR SURGICAL DRESS PROJECT

Plans for the surgical dressings project were rapidly being whipped into shape and work rooms have been set up in the new Red Cross building headquarters, 418 Main street, it was learned Saturday from Mrs. Ralph R. Macartney, general chairman.

Work tables, which have been made to specifications for the work, were donated, Mrs. Macartney stated. As soon as the work room is completed, those persons who have registered for the project will be notified. All others wishing to help will please come to the work room at any time. The work room is arranged to accommodate 30 women at one time. It will be necessary for those planning to work on this project to provide themselves with a freshly laundered wash dress which can be put on after they arrive at headquarters. An all-over apron, which completely covers a street dress, may also be used, Mrs. Macartney stated. A clean kerchief or length of cheesecloth with which the worker can completely cover the hair must also be provided. These are regulation orders from the office of the surgeon general of the United States army.

Difficulty in obtaining a well lighted, sufficiently large space for the surgical dressings project, was experienced by those in charge. Through the courtesy of Arnold Gralapp, superintendent of the Klamath Falls schools, space in both Mills and Roosevelt schools was offered but due to transportation difficulties it was unable to accept these locations.

Many points in the city were canvassed, Mrs. Macartney stated. She recently returned from the Bay area and saw the well lighted quarters, completely donated to the work of making surgical dressings for the expeditionary forces. Upon her return to Klamath Falls she felt highly disappointed to find no central location available for this work other than the basement of the Red Cross building.

"This project is not a local one," Mrs. Macartney stated Saturday. "It should come home to everyone who has sons, brothers or sweethearts in the armed forces. We have agreed in undertaking this work to turn out a minimum quota of 1000 dressings per day for eighteen months."

INSTITUTION SUGAR USERS GET RATION

Industrial and institutional users of sugar (restaurants and boarding houses) are now eligible for their November and December allotment, the rationing board announced Monday. The regulations governing sugar rationing provide that the last fifteen days of the old allotment period and the first five days of the new period are designated as a free period, during which time all commercial businesses which use sugar may sign up for their new allotment. After November 5, a deduction will be made for late registrants, a proportion of the amount being taken off for the week or part thereof, which has elapsed since November 1.

Any commercial user who is in doubt as to the allotment period or the regulations covering these periods is asked to phone or call at the War Price and Ration board, 434 Main street, and receive instruction.

ELKS ARRANGE PROGRAM FOR AIR PROSPECTS

The Klamath Falls Elks lodge has arranged a program for Thursday evening, October 15, of interest to all young men who are contemplating entering the armed forces. This program will be for the benefit of those Klamath young men who have already been accepted for service with the U. S. army air forces and for those who are interested in obtaining an appointment as aviation cadet.

All accepted aviation cadets in the Klamath area are invited to attend and if possible to bring a friend who is eligible for this training. Any other interested persons between the ages of 18 and 16, inclusive, are also invited. Sergeant Frank J. Huhin, commander of the local army recruiting office will be on hand to furnish information and literature. Motion pictures of air force service will be shown and an interesting program of entertainment will be provided during the evening. Refreshments will also be served.

Applicants need have no formal education but must be able to pass the mental tests prescribed by the examining board. High school graduates should have no difficulty in obtaining an appointment provided they can pass the physical requirements. Successful applicants will be enlisted in the air force reserve and will remain at home until such time as they are called for active duty which in most cases is approximately 90 days from the date of examination. At the completion of the training period successful cadets will be commissioned as second lieutenants in the army air force with pay up to \$327 per month. Guests are asked to be at the Elks lodge, Third and Main streets, at 8 p. m. Thursday, October 15. No obligation will be attached to the acceptance of this invitation and all young men who expect to be called for service in the near future are urged to attend this affair.

CAMP WHITE SETS NEW VISIT RULES

No "surprise" visits by relatives to members of the armed forces was the recommendation today from headquarters at Camp White. Citing the statement of the USO Travelers Aid society that "surprise visits, in most cases, lead to nothing but bitter and expensive disappointment," several rules for those visiting men at their posts were suggested.

Visitors must know the exact name and rank of the service man they seek, should advise the service man, preferably by registered mail of the visit, and wait for an answer before starting.

Definite arrangements for the meeting place, and plans for transportation and housing should be understood by both parties before the visit. The vis-

itor should have sufficient funds to allow for several delays, and must not talk about visit or discuss the location or movements of the service man visited. While on the visit, do not seek information on casualties of any army or navy unit. Such information is sent at once to the designated next of kin and is not available to others.

Rumors concerning the movements of the service man's station should be ignored. Arrangements for rooms should be made before the visit. Since living quarters near posts are generally limited, such arrangements should be made many days in advance if possible.

And lastly, leave the baby at home, unless the visitor has made very definite arrangements for a room in a place where children are allowed.
