

OREGON SHOWS DEEP DROP IN REGISTRATION

SALEM, Oct. 13 (AP)—Registration for the November 3 election in 22 of Oregon's 36 counties is down 13.3 per cent from the record total for the 1940 general election, state department said today.

Both parties lost heavily in those counties, with democratic losses far exceeding those of the republicans.

There are 363,741 voters in the 22 counties, a loss of 55,894 since the general election two years ago. There are 182,028 republicans, a loss of 23,166, while there are 178,652 democrats, a drop of 31,889.

Two years ago the democratic total was only 5751 less than the republican figure, the closest the democrats had ever been to the republican total. But this year, the republican lead will be far greater because of the ground the democrats have lost in the past two years.

STIMSON DENIES KNERR TALK RIGHT

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 13 (AP)—Mrs. Norbert Klein, chairman of a Milwaukee town hall program committee, said Monday that Col. Hugh J. Knerr, retired former chief of staff of the general headquarters army air force, was unable to appear at a town hall meeting last night because of an order from Secretary Stimson.

Mrs. Klein said that Col. Knerr telegraphed her and stated that Secretary Stimson had given the following order:

"You are directed to refrain from all public addresses, written words and all comments on the conduct of the war and questions relating to the tactical use and organizational relationship of the armed forces of the United States and her allies."

Col. Knerr wired that in "compliance with this order, I will not be able to appear at town hall," Mrs. Klein said. "My apologies," the telegram added, "for a policy that reserves freedom of expression to but one side of the question and denies true air power to the United States."

Col. Knerr, in a statement issued in New York Friday, criticized Admiral Thomas C. Hart, a member of the navy's policy making general board, for an article Hart wrote in a weekly magazine, arguing against a separate United States air force.

Ginger Rogers Will Help War Bond Sale in Medford

MEDFORD, Oct. 13 (AP)—Ginger Rogers of the movies, who owns a stock ranch near here, will promote the sale of war bonds and stamps during a street carnival Saturday night.

Navy Calls for Qualified Engineers

SEATTLE, Oct. 13 (AP)—The 13th naval district staff headquarters Monday made a special call for graduate engineers and men with construction experience, for organization of several more construction battalions. Each such battalion requires 16 commissioned and 10 warrant officers, said Capt. W. J. Giles, director of officer procurement for this district.

Commissioned officers should have a college degree in electrical, mechanical, civil or architectural engineering, though men with outstanding experience of more than 15 years may substitute it for the educational requirement. All officers must be field men. No draftsmen, office men or architects are needed.

The passing of another southern Oregon pioneer was learned here Tuesday when death of Mrs. Ed Bond of Ashland was reported to her mother, B. S. "Back" Grigsby of this city. Mrs. Bond died late Monday

night in Ashland following a lengthy illness. She was the youngest of a family of eight children born to Henry and Anna Mariah Grigsby, Jackson county pioneers who crossed the plains in the late '60s from their home in Missouri.

Ollie Mae Grigsby was born in Jackson county 69 years ago. She married Ed Bond and for 45 years the family lived in the Plush and Warner sections of Lake county where they ranched and ran cattle. For 20 years of

that time they operated on the west side of Lakeview. Two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Bond retired and moved to Ashland. Mrs. Bond's death followed a lengthy illness. In addition to Mr. Bond, a daughter, Mrs. Ruby Russell of Ashland, one brother, B. S. Grigsby, and a half brother, Charles Thomas of Winlock, Wash., survive.

Funeral services will be held in Lakeview Wednesday afternoon with burial in the ceme-

tery there. Among those who plan to attend the final rites are Mr. Grigsby, his four daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth Sanders, Mrs. Ida Grimes, Mrs. O. L. Brown and Mrs. Henry Grimes, and an old family friend, Mrs. Ivy Propst.

Here are some macaroni dishes that are dependable and exceptionally tempting.

Baked MACARONI & CHEESE

1/2 lb. macaroni 1/2 tsp. pepper
3 tbsp. butter 1/2 lb. grated American cheese
3 tbsp. flour 1 cup dry bread crumbs
2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon salt

Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water until tender; rinse, drain. Make white sauce of butter, flour, milk and seasonings; add 2/3 of the cheese, stir till melted. Pour over macaroni in greased baking dish. Sprinkle crumbs and remaining cheese over top. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees) 30 minutes. For Tomato Macaroni, add 1 1/2 cups cooked tomatoes after half the macaroni is added. Serves six.

QUICK SPAGHETTI DINNER

1/2 lb. ham, macaroni, tomatoes, and cheese

1/4 cup shortening 1 No. 2 1/2 can (3 1/2 cups) chopped tomatoes
1 large onion 1/4 tsp. salt
1 large green pepper cut in thin strips 1/2 lb. spaghetti
1 eight-oz. can mushrooms 1/2 tsp. pepper
1 lb. diced ham 1/2 lb. grated American cheese

Melt shortening in deep-sided frying pan; add chopped onion and saute; add green pepper strips, mushrooms and liquid, diced ham, tomatoes, seasonings, and spaghetti in order given. Mix well; cover, and cook slowly about 25 minutes, or until spaghetti is tender, stirring occasionally. Add grated cheese, and serve at once. Serves 8 to 10.

MACARONI & Tomato SAUCE

Heat one can tomato soup or puree, butter the size of an egg, in sauce pan and season. Boil a half-pound of macaroni, drain, but do not chill. Mix immediately with tomato sauce and serve hot. Serves 4 to 6. For variety: 1 or 2 tbsp. of chopped onion, 1/2 cup chopped pepper or a chopped pimiento.
