LANGELL SETS COUNTY VALUE AT \$33,000,000

Klamath county's total assessed valuation for tax purposes this year is \$33,000,000. It was announced Tuesday by County Assessor Fred Langell. This compares with \$32,146,006.36 last year.

The assessed value is divided as follows:
Real estate and improvements, \$17,144,905.
Personal property, \$5,883,280.
Public utilities, \$10,017,411.29.

This makes a total of \$33,045,996.29, from which \$39,630 soldier's exemption is subtracted.

Taxes to be collected in the current year total \$1,760,431.72. These taxes are for the fiscal year, July 1, 1942, to June 30, 1943, said Langell, who turned the tax roll over to the sheriff for collection this week.

Taxes on the new roll are due for collection on November 15, 1942.
