Japanese Fliers Reported In Plea to Join U. S. Force

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Oct. 14 (P)—Some Japanese fliers, shot down and captured by American forces in the South Pacific, have pleaded for a chance to become Americans and join the allied air force, Brig. Gen. Edwin Perrin, new commanding officer of the fourth air service area command, said Monday.

Gen. Perrin, who returned from Australia Aug. 12, said some of the few Jap fliers taken prisoner have asked to take out either American or Australian naturalization papers so they can join the allied force.

Few Jap fliers wear parachutes and those that do bail out are generally attacked by their own forces, Gen. Perrin said, explaining that the Japs feel it a family and national disgrace to be taken prisoner. Families of captured fliers are notified they have died, he said.

"But occasionally some Jap fliers are captured and in several cases, they have pleaded to join our air forces," Gen. Perrin said. Said to be the youngest gen-

eral in the U. S. army, 37-year-old Gen. Perrin declined to comment on the relative abilities of Jap and American fighter planes in the South Pacific, but added that "most of our planes come back, while most of the Jap planes don't return."

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MISSING KLAMATH YOUTHS REVEALED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (P)—The navy department today announced casualty list No. 14 including for Oregon two dead, one wounded and 11 missing.

The following are missing: Charles O. Findholt, seaman, second class; Mrs. Beatrice Crowder, Pelican City, Klamath Falls, mother. Joseph F. Sexton, seaman second class, naval reserve; Francis Sexton, 235 Riverside avenue, Klamath Falls, father.

The two Klamath boys were members of the crew of the destroyer Jarvis which disappeared after a battle in the South Pacific. News of the boys' disappearance has previously been published.

Pacific Logging Congress Cancelled

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14 (P)—The Pacific Logging congress will not be held here this month as scheduled because the industry is too busy producing for war.

Instead, said Secretary A. A. Whinnant, the annual session probably will be here Jan. 21-23 when winter forces the shutdown of many operations. The decision was announced after a conference of logging operators with R. H. Brundage, western lumber administrator.
