

The Hard Way--Londos of Washington State Boots Field Goals, Conversions for Scoring Position

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 14 (AP)—Frank Londos, who couldn't quite make the Washington State college starting lineup, was in the football spotlight today as one of the Pacific Coast conference's leading scorers because his coach suddenly discovered that Frank had an eye for the uprights and a toe for the ball.

Big Frank, 201 pounds of genial senior, had never done any goal kicking at WSC before the Oregon game nine days ago. Today he is credited with six after-touchdown conversions in seven attempts.

He is tied with Dick Bowman of Montana for second place in conference scoring with 18 points—nine below Bob Kennedy, the fullback who kept Frank off the starting eleven at WSC. Understudying Kennedy Saturday, as the conference leaders swamped Montana, 68 to 16, Londos scored two touchdowns as well as five conversions.

It all began when Coach Babe Hollingbery took Londos aside as the squad was warming up for the Oregon fracas, led him down to the goal line and personally held the ball while Frank kicked. Few in the crowd noticed the sidelight. Half an hour later the Babe waved his new-made specialist into the game and Londos scored his first conversion in his first attempt.

He kicked two more in the Montana game before his only miss so far, then lofted three in a row.

The big fellow's capable toe had WSC fans predicting an end to a long drought of place-kickers at the school, which has had several outstanding totem.

Archie Buckley, back in 1929, connected with a 47-yard field goal against Oregon State.

Good kicking by End Lyle Maskell took Washington State into the Rose Bowl in 1931 on the strength of a field goal against Washington. The following fall Johnny Eubank won three games for WSC with his kicking—although he was in action hardly more than a minute during the entire season.

One of the Eubank boots was a 45-yard field goal classic against UCLA, in which the final gun fired while the ball was still flying towards the uprights with the three points that broke the 0-0 deadlock.

Strangler Ed Lewis Wants Crack at Japs

Veteran of 6000 Matches Wants to be Commando; May Teach Jiu-Jitsu

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7 (AP)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, the bone-crusher who has wrestled 6,000 matches, claimed the world's title five times and begun a comeback at 51, is about ready to give it all up now—and start breaking up Japs.

The Strangler, just a shadow of his former self at 280 pounds, came here for an exhibition battle and said he wanted to be a commando.

And if Uncle Sam rules him out, he added, he'll ask permission to teach soldiers Jiu-Jitsu on the theory that "once they see how simple it is, they won't worry about the Japs using it on them."

Lewis, whom the years have treated well financially, said he "played a trick on those little fellows" himself on his last trip to the Orient.

"Outside Kobe our ship passed their fleet and I got up on the bridge and made movies of it," he explained. "The captain said they'd kill me for life—but I walked ashore carrying the camera—and photographed the Imperial Palace."

"They arrested my chauffeur, but not me. I guess I was just so big they were flabbergasted. They said nothing to me, and all my film is now in the hands of our government."

The Strangler said he had reduced 90 pounds in eight months "by God's exercise—walking" and felt more fit than ever.

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TULELAKE BEER PARLORS AGREE TO NIGHT BAN

TULELAKE—Proprietors of local establishments that sold liquor by mutual agreement last weekend, will for the duration of the harvest season refuse to sell liquor between the hours of 10 p. m. and 8 a. m. Oregon Sports Notes

When Cliff Hansen, the AP traffic department's traveling mechanic—and a confirmed football fan, heard that the air conditioning went blooey on the coach in which Oregon State's football team was traveling to Los Angeles, he roared:

"No wonder they lost to UCLA. Anybody caught in one of those blast-furnaces is done in. I know. It's happened to me."

Coach Lon Stiner and his lads didn't offer the accident as an alibi and but for a mention by L. H. Gregory in the Oregonian it might never have come to light. But once the fact was known, Cliff was satisfied—he knew why OSC took a trouncing.

"Boy, I'm telling you it's awful. I got in a coach that lost its ventilating system in northern California. Greg's story said the temperature reached 105 degrees. My experience is that it goes closer to 120 degrees. The train was crowded but the passengers jammed into other coaches and stood up in the aisles. They say the OSC players weren't able to do that. Well, no wonder they lost. You can't spend five hours in a Turkish bath on Thursday or Friday and expect to play any kind of a ball game Saturday."

"Another thing when the air conditioning fails, the steam heat usually is restored first, and you get a few blasts of hot air first."

"If the experience of the Oregon State boys was anything at all like mine, it's a wonder they were able to last 15 minutes of the football game."

Washington's succession of hard-running left halfbacks carry the Huskies' hope this year. They certainly turned a first-quarter dog-fight with Oregon into a last-half romp.

Washington had a pretty good line and a reasonably diverse attack, but what struck this observer was their rapid-fire running once the team got rolling. Erickson, Provo, Robinson, Walters worked in relays with no let-up. When the running game worked they didn't bother with passes, just non-stop running, around end, through tackle, occasionally varied by a spinner through center. Pest Welch kept a fresh runner in there always.

It fagged the Oregonians. In the last quarter the best of the Web-foot linemen looked flat-footed from fatigue.

The Huskies fiddled around a little with the T-formation and single wing, but they reverted to familiar stuff for their best plays—the old Notre Dame formation which Mr. Phelan used to teach.

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Baseball Future Up For December Ruling

Major, Minor Executives Gather in Chicago to Decide Wartime Program

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 (AP)—The wartime future of baseball, insofar as the magnates are masters of their own fate, is to be determined at meetings of both the major and minor leagues in Chicago the first week in December.

The majors now are in the process of approving the change of the site of their sessions from New York and the date to coincide with the minors, but it was learned today that enough clubs already have agreed to the switch to make the doubleheader meetings certain.

The major league confabs are planned for December 1, 2 and 3, a week earlier than usual, and the minors meeting December 4 and 5, three days later than in the past.

This gathering, one of the few times that majors and minors ever have assembled together, will replace the big convention of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, originally scheduled for Minneapolis, as well as the major league pow wows in New York.

The Minneapolis meeting was cancelled more than a month ago by William G. Bramham, president of the National Association (the minors), to conform with the wishes of the office of defense transportation and at the time it was planned to have only a session of the league presidents.

However, the revised arrangement will make possible the presence of minor league club officials and major league representatives who sponsor many of the teams in the small circuits.

Fresno State Rolls Up 170 Points in First Three Games

FRESNO, Calif., Oct. 14 (AP) The Fresno State football team certainly isn't doing much to avoid inflation.

The Bulldogs have rolled up 170 points in three games, 51 against Whittier, 53 against Occidental and 66 against San Diego.

Little Jackie Fellows has fired the big guns for Fresno. He has completed 27 of his 53 passes for 417 yards.

SHOTS EYED AS SCRAP
BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 14 (AP)—Sports Editor Bob Phillips of the Birmingham Age-Herald estimates that more than 500 colleges and at least 5000 or more high schools and preparatory schools in the country sponsor track teams.

He figures that nearly every college team should have several spare 15-pound shots and preparatory schools plenty of extra 12-pounders. If each school donated at least one shot, the scrap drive would be bolstered by at least 75,000 pounds of metal, he says.

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
