

WHITE SHIELD HOME HANDLES 9 MORE CASES

Nine cases from Klamath county were handled at a cost of \$1,665.62 at the Salvation Army's White Shield home for unwed mothers in the last year, it is shown in a statistical review of Salvation Army work announced Thursday in connection with the current drive for the S. A. annual fund.

In the year the local unit of the Salvation Army provided relief for 1,021 local unwed mothers, family men, women and children. It handled 2,040 grocery orders, garments, shoes, fares and other aid.

The S. A. employment work included reception of 189 applications and 186 placements. Twenty-two prisoners were paroled to the Salvation Army in the year, and eight parolees were discharged.

At Christmas time, the army provided 215 baskets of food containing 986 meals and 185 toys and gifts.

In commenting upon the statistical report, Chairman Lee Jacobs of the army drive said:

"It is impossible to tell the true story of 'Social Service Plus' as accomplished by the Salvation Army. This report cannot do justice to the fine service rendered in the past year by Major and Mrs. Norman Bowyer, who have recently left us for a new field. Major W. C. Curry, the new commanding officer, has already mapped out a heavy and ambitious program for the new year, richly deserving of the support I am sure Klamath Falls is ready to give the Salvation Army in the drive we are now opening."

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Red Cross Notes

We have had a great many inquiries as to when first aid classes would again be held. An American standard first aid class will start at Klamath Union high school on October 20. This class will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week until the course is completed. The class will start promptly at 7:30 p. m. and will last two hours, until 9:30 p. m. The instructor will be A. H. Mead.

More knitters are needed for army turtle-neck sweaters. Get material and instructions for these at our headquarters, 418 Main street.

The headquarters is gradually getting into good shape but we need chairs for the workers. If you have an unused common chair you will be doing your Red Cross a service if you will donate it. About fifty are urgently needed.

Our government has asked us to furnish kit bags for the soldiers. The Red Cross furnishes the bag, which should contain the following articles: cigarettes, soap box and soap, chewing gum, writing tablet and envelopes, pencil, playing cards (this is optional), shoe polishing cloth, double edge razor blades, one pair 40-inch tan shoe laces, and a "housewife" containing the usual sewing necessities. These are greatly needed as every boy who leaves this country is furnished with one. There are now 150 bags on hand to be filled immediately. If you do not feel that you can fill one of the bags, or more, any donations that you may care to give for this purpose will help, and the Red Cross will fill them. The contents of each bag costs about \$1.50.

The officers of the National Red Cross are still working on the problem of relief for American prisoners of war in Japan and Japanese-occupied territory. The extension of relief to prisoners of war is a traditional Red Cross service which the American Red Cross regards as one of its primary obligations in time of war. The relief to war prisoners in Europe is operating regularly through the International Red Cross committee. In general, these supplies have been shipped as commercial cargoes to Lisbon where they have been placed aboard ships operated especially for the transportation of such supplies from Lisbon to Marseilles and thence by rail to Geneva for forwarding to prison camps in Germany and Italy. In addition to assistance from American Red Cross funds, agencies interested in the relief of

prisoners of particular nationalities are assisted by the American Red Cross, and the International Red Cross committee is effecting such assistance. American internecine, both from the United States and the few from Central and South American countries, have, when reported to the International Red Cross committee, received regular delivery of American Red Cross food parcels and other assistance, at the expense of the American Red Cross.

The situation with respect to American prisoners detained by Japan is quite different and presents problems which have not yet been solved. After long negotiations and delays the Japanese government advised the U. S. government and the American Red Cross, that it would refuse to allow any neutral vessel to cross the Pacific. However, the Japanese government stated it would have no objection to prisoners of war relief supplies being sent on the exchange ships. This was done on the first sailing of the "Gripsholm" and cargo space will be used by the Red Cross on the second sailing of that vessel which is expected soon. It is recognized, however, that the shipments in these exchange vessels will not meet the situation because they do not provide for the maintenance of a continuous flow of prisoners of war relief, especially necessary for Americans detained in Japan and Japanese-occupied territory.

The American Red Cross is keenly appreciative of the great interest in this problem shown by people in all sections of the country and will continue its aggressive efforts to have this relief furnished as promptly as possible and will continue to regard this problem as one of its most important duties and obligations.

UNIONS CERTIFIED AT WEYERHAEUSER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—The National Labor Relations board today certified CIO's International Woodworkers of America as the bargaining agent for production and maintenance employees of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, Klamath Falls.

The same decision certified AFL's International Association of Machinists as the bargaining agent for employees of the timber company's machine shop, including electricians, car men, millwrights and their helpers.

The workers expressed their preferences in a run-off election Sept. 10, under supervision of the regional director of the board.

In the sawmill workers election, of the 337 valid ballots counted, 250 were for the IWA and 87 for the Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union. The machinists voted: IAM, 55; IWA, 12; Lumber and Sawmill Workers, 3.

WPB Registering Construction Machinery

PORTLAND, Oct. 15 (AP)—In an attempt to overcome a shortage of construction machinery, the war production board is registering all used equipment in Oregon.

Oregon WPB Manager J. Fred Bergsch said all such machinery purchased or leased prior to October 1 must be registered by owners by October 31.
