Beach Gun Victim Killed by Bullet From Own Weapon

SEASIDE, Oct. 16 (AP)—Donald William Crantford, 20-year-old Portlander who was found on the beach here mortally wounded Oct. 6, was killed by a bullet of the same caliber as those in a gun discovered beside him, a coroner's autopsy disclosed yesterday. Crantford was challenged by

a military sentry that night, said Chief of Police Harry Kemmerer, and the sentry fired when he heard a shot after the challenge. Crantford, wounded in the head, was found with a .32 caliber gun at his side. He died three hours later in a hospital.

Previously Crantford had been warned by the sentry to keep off the beach, a restricted zone.
