

UNIONS URGE INSPECTION OF LUMBER CAMPS

SEATTLE, Oct. 16 (P)—As the new Pacific lumber commission of the war labor board opened consideration of its second case yesterday, International Woodworkers of America (CIO) spokesmen urged the commissioners to go out into the woods and "see for themselves."

The commission took the proposal that they visit northwest timber operations under advisement after employer spokesmen said they would have no objections to a visit to the mills and logging camp.

The second case involved a dispute between the IWA and Pacific Northwest operators. The first case was taken under advisement.

President Worth Lowery of the union listed these demands: Equal pay in all Douglas fir operations for the same kind of work done in 45 classifications and an increase in minimum pay to 95 cents an hour. The minimum now is 82 cents an hour on an average.

Shortage of manpower is one of the industry's chief problems, he said. "Our manpower requirements," he told the commission, "are being hampered by the fact that longshoremen, shipyard workers and those in many other industries are getting higher pay than the logging operators and sawmill owners are unwilling to pay the men in the lumber industry."

"As a result, new men are unwilling to go to work in the logging camps and mills where they risk being frozen at lower wage levels than many workers on jobs which carry less hazards."

For every 15.4 new men hired, 17.6 men left the lumber industry between last December and August 1, Louis Solomon, regional director of the department of labor's bureau of statistics, testified.

Sprague Appoints Waterman to Harney County DA Position

SALEM, Oct. 16 (AP)—Governor Charles A. Sprague Thursday appointed Leonard Waterman, Burns, as district attorney for Harney county, succeeding H. V. Schmalz, Burns, whose disbarment by the state supreme court made him ineligible to hold the office.

Waterman will serve until Jan. 1, 1945, it being too late to fill the office at the November 3 election. The law provides that when a vacancy occurs in an office on or after October 14, the vacancy shall not be filled at the November 3 election.

If Schmalz had been disbarred even one day earlier, Waterman would have been appointed only for two and a half months, instead of for more than two years.

5000-Mile Routes Bring Aid Overland to China



It's five times as far from the docks to Chungking on China's new overland aid routes as it was on the old Burma road from Rangoon. Anticipating Jap seizure of the latter link, China began working on an alternate route to the railroad from Calcutta and Bombay, but this mountainous road is not yet complete. Until it is, or until the Burma Road is retaken, war aid for China may go only by air, or by the 5000-mile routes from Karachi or Iran shown on map.

Winter Seeding Started, Harvest Nears Conclusion In Oregon, Says Bulletin

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 (P)—Winter seeding has started and harvest neared conclusion in Oregon last week, the department of commerce-weather bureau's crop-weather bulletin reported Thursday.

Temperatures varied widely. Madras' 88 was the highest recorded although most Willamette and south and east Oregon communities enjoyed 80-degree weather. Night minimums in the valley were in the high 30s, in southern and eastern Oregon in the low 30s and the 20s. Madras also had the week's lowest reading, 21 degrees. The low temperatures caused no damage. Rains were generally west of the Cascades but were light with local exceptions.

There was some seeding of

winter grain, but many growers still delay until soil moisture increases. Conditions have been favorable for late threshing.

Apple and late pears are being picked under good conditions save for the labor shortage. Filbert harvest is well advanced but many walnuts remain to be gathered.

Rains have improved pasture but more rain is needed. Movement of livestock to fall feeding grounds continues. Tomatoes continue to reach markets in quantities; sugar beet and potato digging goes on. A little lettuce is still being shipped.

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 (AP)—Charles A. Tennant, 65, a retired policeman whose big moments were not confined to his constabulary service, died Thursday of a heart attack. From 1888 to 1905 he drove a hack here. His fares included Theodore Roosevelt, James J. Jeffries and Liverpool Liz—a theatrical figure of the 90's said to be the first white woman ever to smoke a cigar in Oregon. Before that he drove a stage from The Dalles to Prineville, frequently carrying considerable gold.

He joined the police force in 1906. For five years he was chauffeur for Mayor Joseph K. Carson.

Time of the crash was placed at 4:43 P.M., two miles from the Chicago airport. The plane had taken off from Warrensburg a short time earlier on a routine training flight to Chicago.

Oregon Expected To Yield 150,000 Tires in U. S. Sale

PORTLAND, Oct. 16 (AP)—Oregon is expected to yield 150,000 tires next month when OPA calls them in at the start of gasoline rationing. Barney Reynolds, tire rationer, said Thursday.

Each car owner will be permitted to keep five tires, but must turn over any extras to the OPA at ceiling prices.

THE MILK SITUATION

Recent comment regarding the local market milk situation has led to many rumors and we believe a statement clarifying the situation should be made.

We very definitely feel our first obligation is to make certain every person in Klamath Falls and vicinity, who in the past have depended on the local milk supply, shall continue to receive all the milk desired.

We have repeatedly stated that under no circumstances would we accept any business that would in any way jeopardize local milk deliveries. Every quart of milk ordered must be delivered.

We also very definitely feel we have another obligation and that is to return to the milk producers every cent possible. With the tremendous increase in wages in many other occupations the dairymen have been sorely pressed to keep up even a semblance of normal labor conditions on the farms.

The milk sold the United States Quartermaster for delivery to the Japanese Evacuee Center has made possible the paying of a very great amount of money to the dairymen that would have not been possible otherwise.

This section entered the spring season with a great surplus of milk that definitely taxed all local manufacturing plants to handle. The increased demand not only took up this surplus but made it worth more to the producers than ever before.

We very definitely feel there will continue to be sufficient milk for every person in this community unless labor conditions become so acute the local dairymen are forced to liquidate. This has happened already in many places.

Local market milk distributors have made a voluntary price increase to all producers without any corresponding increase to the consumer. Any further relief for producers must come in a general price increase and this is possible only through permission from OPA to raise the price ceiling one cent a quart.

Regardless of rumors we will never short our customers a single quart of milk as long as any supply is available.
