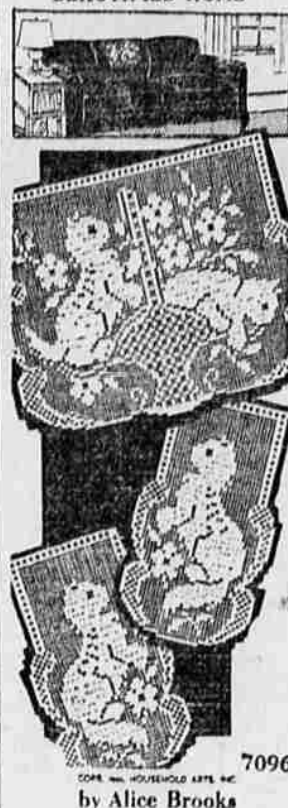

SERVICE MAILING BOXES IN DEMAND

More than 800 of the 1400 wooden Christmas boxes distributed by the Pelican Bay Lumber company for men in the service, have been sought by friends and relatives and it is possible that firm will turn out double the amount now completed before holiday shipments are over.

The boxes are now being made in three sizes. The large size is generally recognized as the maximum for overseas shipment and is about the size of a shoe box. Maximum shipment overseas is 11 pounds, but it is understood that the government prefers a seven-pound weight. The next size box is approximately half the size of the shoe box, and the small box is just large enough to hold a carton of cigarettes or such combinations as four tins of smoking tobacco together with cigarette papers and two packages of cigarettes or some razor blades and a pipe.

Boxes may be tied with heavy cord or nailed, according to local postal authorities. Pelican Bay Lumber company is distributing the boxes through the two Klamath Falls banks and the chamber of commerce. Those unable to obtain the boxes during the week may get them evenings at either the Hall or Elk hotels.

H. D. Mortenson of the lumber company stated that the boxes are being built to help those who want to send gifts to men overseas. There is no charge for the boxes and they bear no advertising. Deadline for overseas shipment is November 1, postal authorities stated. After that date delivery cannot be guaranteed.

It is probable that they had merely been out on a work party, and were getting back hungry and tired and soiled by their labors.

But you never know. The war isn't remote here.

AS always and everywhere when full and accurate news is lacking, the grapevine runs 24 hours a day here, and some of the underground tales you hear are thriller-dillers.

But this must be said for the people of San Diego: You hear practically NO rumors of ship movements. This town has been so close to the navy so long that practically everyone knows the tragic consequences that may follow gossip that reveals the movement of ships and the precious freight of lives they carry.

FOSTER LEADS PELICAN TEAM OVER MEDFORD

He lofted a high boomer which Foster, as Pelican safety man, picked up on his own 30. Swirling down the left sidelines, picking up blockers as he went, "Baldy" swept past the 50, cut to the right, sidestepped two Tiger tacklers and continued on down to the end zone and the second Klamath score, as 5000 fans, who ringed the bright green Medford field went berserk.

Vaillancour failed to get off the conversion and the half ended at 13-0.

Loose Again
Again in the third, Foster cracked loose with a 55-yard punt return which ended in pay territory but the ball was recalled to the 16 from which the Klamaths were penalized 15 yards for clipping.

But the game was not all Foster. Playing nearly errorless ball, an entire Klamath team from first stringers through third went superbly at the business of hanging the worst defeat on a Medford eleven that a Klamath squad ever has in the long rivalry.

It was the third Klamath victory in 29 years. Twice before the teams have tied at 0-0. Twenty-four times Medford has won.

Mast Drives
Don Mast, game co-captain with Neil Mayfield, time after time crashed directly through the whole Tornado team for huge gains. Twice, running from punt formation, the senior fullback shredded the Medford wall for close to 40 yards at a crack. His first one, good for 47 yards down to the enemy 8 was nullified by Foster's fumble on the next play which Medford recovered.

His second slashing drive, in the third quarter, carried him from Medford's 42 down to the eight from where, two plays later, Foster heaved a flat pass to Coddington, hovering on the left flank, good for a touchdown and the third Klamath score.

Shortgen Tallies
Vaillancour's kick was good, bringing the count to 20-0 and foreshadowing the final outcome.

Sophomore Hank Shortgen tallied the next one early in the fourth but it also was set up by Mast. Pat Patzke, huge Klamath tackle, had flopped on a Medford fumble on the Tornado 43, but Dick Vaillancour lost a pair back to the 45.

Here Mast packed a reverse for 24 yards down to the 21. Shortgen gained three at tackle and Mast added seven more over left guard. On the next play, Shortgen bulled and squirmed through for the balance.

Selby Intercepts
Vaillancour's first kick was blocked and a re-attempt was waved down by the referee as slightly wide.

The fifth and final Klamath score started when Quarterback Arnold Selby clapped his hands on Medford's Adams' pass on the Klamath 40.

Mast started it off with four over right tackle, then heaved one to Young just over the line and the reserve end hammered on down to the Medford 43 before he was stopped. The same

play was good for 13 more, down to the 20.

Then Mast picked up three, Foster three, and Mast five more for a first down on the Tornado 19.

The sensational fullback again lugged it and picked up five at left guard.

Here Shortgen faded back, tossed one far out to the right where Billy Bayliss, Tiger fullback, tipped it in the air and Mayfield grabbed it on the three and sliced across.

Quarterback Jack Baker, blocked Vaillancour's last try. Coach Large Frank Ramsey threw in his reserves, then, and from the Klamath 40 the second and third teamers had punched down to the Medford 35 toward another score when the gun ended it.

Only twice during the ball game did Medford appear to threaten and both times it was a short pass which last year, with better men, spelled a touchdown. Steve Dippel, state 100-yard dash titlist, dropped way back as the Medford line allowed the charging Klamath wall to filter by. Then with seven Tigers massed alone, Dippel spun the ball over the Klamath head to a Medford receiver who followed the bunched interference.

Good for 17 yards once and close to 20 another time, it was nevertheless stopped by the Klamath secondary.

Summaries revealed that the Pelicans overwhelmed the lighter Tigers on the ground, 178 yards to 29, but fell behind in the air, 89 to 53. Totals found Klamath ahead from scrimmage, 231 to 118.

Klamath piled up 12 first downs to the Tornado's six. The home team completed six out of 14 passes and the Klamaths finished four out of seven.

MARITAL-DRAFT ISSUE CLEARED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—The answers to the oft-asked questions "when is a child not a child, and when is a married man not a married man, for draft purposes?" went into the records of congress Friday.

They were given by Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, head man in the selective service program, during hearings by the house military committee on legislation to lower the draft age.

As far as selective service is concerned, General Hershey said, marriages that took place after last Dec. 7, the day of the attack on Pearl Harbor, "don't make any difference."

"When do you call a child not a child?" asked Representative Kilday (D-Tex.).

"Any dependent acquired after Dec. 7, or when induction is considered imminent, is not considered dependent," Hershey replied.

"He told me he would call me the next night," Juvenile Officer Dorothy Pulas quoted the girl as saying. "I waited for three nights, but he never called."

Father of a 17-month-old son, Flynn, who was divorced last April by Screen Actress Lily Damita, was released under \$1000 bail pending preliminary hearing Oct. 23.

"I can't understand what all this is about," said the 33-year-old British-born actor in denying the charge. "I hardly spoke to the girl, and certainly I did not harm her."

The complaint against Flynn was signed by Mrs. Jack Marsden, the girl's sister. It also charged three youthful film studio employees with making subsequent morals attacks upon the girl.

Listed as Armand Knapp, 18, Morris Black, 22, and Joseph Gerald, 20, they already are in custody.

Under California law, a sex offense against a girl under 18, regardless of consent, constitutes rape.

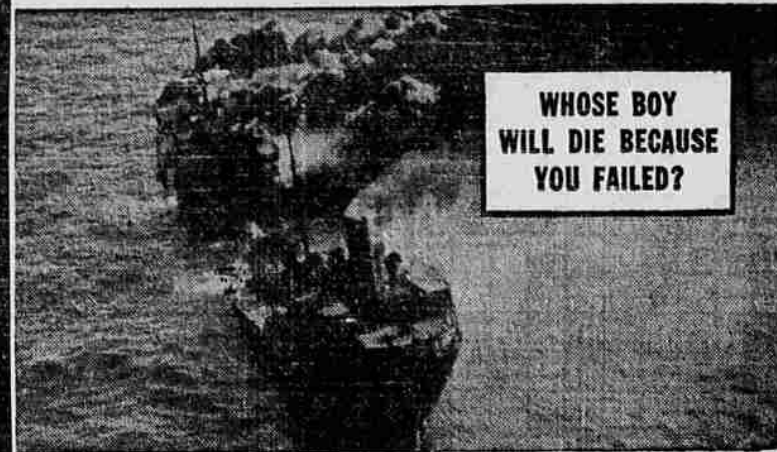
