# Classes Slated to Start Next Week

### Surgical Dressings Project in Red Cross Rooms Attracts Many Klamath Falls Women.

Klamath women have shown their interest in the new surgical dressings project and classes will be under way soon it was learned from Mrs. Ralph R. Macartney Sr., chairman of this project which will run for approximately eighteen months. There has been a little difficulty in obtaining carpenter labor but this has been ironed out and as soon as the work is completed, classes should get under way. The exact day and hour will be announced by Mrs. Macartney this coming week.

An ample number of women have registered for the surgical dressings project, one of the most worthwhile types of war work yet offered to Klamath women. Mrs. Macartney is very much pleased with the interest shown and hopes to average at least thirty women a day turning out the dressings which will go to hospital units in the Pacific.

Any woman interested will find a place at the table and there will be a trained instructor on hand to get the work under way. Women may plan to work during the day or during the evening, as their own personal interests dictate.

These dressings are made on a diagram, and ninety of these diagrams were completed by the advanced mechanical drawing class of Klamath Union high school. LeRoy Erdmann is instructor. The boys donated their time in making these diagrams which are now ready for use.

Other donations include partitions from Don R. Drury and R. R. Macartney, and tables to be used in the project room, basement of Red Cross headquarters on Main street, were donated by the Weyerhaeuser Timber company.

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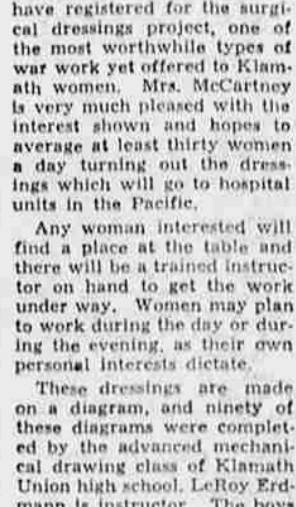
