

Vote Campaign Is Goal of League

Women Voters Hope To See Klamath Adults Reach Polls on November Third

"Ballots are bullets!" This is the slogan of the League of Women Voters, which is sponsoring a get-out-to-vote campaign, and urging that every citizen give his voice and his vote to America this November 3, at the general election. Vote for the best that America affords, the second best will not do, crys the league.

In order that citizens of Klamath Falls will have an opportunity to hear many candidates outline their platforms, and hear the pros and cons on state measures which will appear upon the November ballot, the Klamath County League of Women Voters is holding two candidates meetings. This project is traditional with the league which has scheduled candidates meetings prior to elections for many years.

The first of the meetings will be held Monday evening, October the nineteenth, at eight o'clock in the small club room of the city library, and the other at two o'clock Monday afternoon, November the second, at the same place.

Mrs. Everett R. Dennis, local league president, announces that local candidates will speak, and possibly candidates for state and national offices.

Mrs. Isabelle Brixner, county school supervisor, will present both sides of the Oregon State Teachers association measure, providing that all money received from the state income tax in excess of \$7,750,000 in any year shall be distributed to public school districts and union high school districts.

Malcolm Epley, managing editor of the Herald and News, will present pros and cons of the other six measures.

These measures include: the so-called cigarette tax; the proposed constitutional amendment increasing salaries of Oregon legislators and extending the regular legislative sessions from 40 to 50 days; the referendum of the 1941 law prohibiting net fishing on coastal streams and bays; repeal of the rural credits fund amendment; prohibition use of highway funds for any other than highway purposes, and amendment authorizing regulation by law of voting privilege forfeiture.

Candidates who will probably speak at Monday evening's league meeting will be W. F. Chase, Fred Pope and Jack Benner, who are all in the race for county commissioner, and Allen Sloan and Newton Nelson, candidates for county assessor.

City office candidates to appear will include Harold Franey for police judge and council candidates Rollin Cantrell, Harvey Martin and J. J. Keller.

Henry Semon and Harry Boivin, both candidates for reelection to the state legislature, are scheduled to speak, and it is possible that Congressman Walter Pierce, candidate for national representation from Oregon, and his opponent, Lowell Stockman, may appear, according to Mrs. Dennis.

Candidates whose names will appear upon the ballot, but who will not be present at the meeting will include Earl Snell and Lew Wallace, state gubernatorial candidates, and Charles McNary and Walter Whitbeck, candidates for United States senator from Oregon.

"Let each voter keep uppermost in his mind his responsibility at the polls this fall," says Mrs. Dennis. "Let each voter be conscious of his ballot. This is war. Ballots are bullets today."

The public, men as well as women, are cordially invited to attend these candidates meetings sponsored by the League of Women Voters.

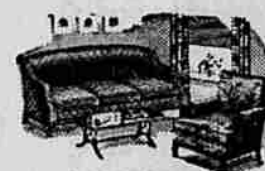
It was announced that a regular meeting of the Garden club will be held October
