

FEDERAL CASH OUTLAY SAID \$78 BILLION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt told congress that federal cash expenditures for war in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1943, now were estimated at \$74,000,000,000 and non-war outlays at \$4,194,000,000.

In addition, interest on the public debt in this 12-month period was estimated at \$1,850,000,000 to bring aggregate federal outlays for the current fiscal period to \$80,044,000,000.

Non-war expenditures of the government, Mr. Roosevelt reported, have been cut more than a third from their 1939 peak.

The chief executive submitted a 96-page analysis of trends of non-war governmental spending which showed that from a peak of \$6,516,000,000 in 1939 they had dropped 36.5 per cent. Those estimated for this year are nearly \$1,000,000,000 under the figure for the last fiscal period.

They compare with a low of \$2,454,000,000 in 1933. Covering Mr. Roosevelt's entire tenure in the White House, the report showed war expenditures had jumped upward from a low of \$578,000,000 in 1934, passing the billion dollar mark for the first time in 1938. The total for the 1941 fiscal year was \$6,301,000,000 and for the last fiscal year, subject to minor final adjustments, \$6,011,000,000. The report was prepared by the budget director.

SACRAMENTO AIR DEPOT NEEDS AID

An urgent need for several hundred persons, both men and women, to serve in civilian positions in the army air forces at Sacramento air depot was announced today by the U. S. civil service commission. These positions are vital to the war effort and must be filled at once in order to keep war production at the highest possible level.

The available positions offer opportunities for advancement, plus the advantages of receiving specialized aircraft training from skilled mechanics and instructors while on the job.

A representative of the civil service commission, together with a military officer from the army air forces and a representative of the engineering department of Sacramento air depot, will be in Klamath Falls Wednesday, October 21, to interview applicants and give first hand information on actual employment opportunities at Sacramento air depot.

Persons not classified as I-A in the draft, and over 18 years of age will be interviewed Wednesday, October 21, in the evening at 7:30 at the armory. Persons with a small amount of mechanical experience are urged to apply and may be considered for many of the numerous positions.

Placement will be immediate in positions ranging from the helper to journeyman grade, depending upon experience and qualification. Salaries range from \$1500 to \$2200 per annum, plus time and a half for over forty hours per week.

It should be clearly understood that Sacramento air depot does not desire to remove persons already engaged in critical occupations in war production activities except under conditions to be explained at the meeting, officials said.

64 NEW FACES CERTAIN FOR HOUSE SEATS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—

The house of representatives in the new congress starting in January is certain to have at least 64 new faces without waiting for the November 3 election returns.

With the congressional primary run-offs in Louisiana completed, an Associated Press survey today showed that this was bound to occur because 31 incumbent members were not candidates for reelection, 22 were defeated in the primaries, and seven vacant seats are to be filled in next month's balloting.

In addition, one member has died and three others have resigned to enter the armed forces since their renomination and new nominees have been named.

The survey also disclosed that 100 of the 432 members to be elected November 3 (Maine re-elected its three republicans September 14) can be counted "in" now as they have no opposition. This group includes 89 democrats in 14 states, 10 republicans in five, and one American-labor (Marcantonio, New York).

Four other democratic nominees—in Georgia and Virginia—are virtually certain of election because of only minor party opposition. Eighteen more democratic candidates in the "solid south" have republican opponents.

GILLIAM COUNTY HITS SCRAP GOAL

PORTLAND, Oct. 17 (AP)—The state salvage committee today congratulated Gilliam county as the first Oregon county to achieve the scrap-campaign goal of 200 pounds of metal per person.

Gilliam collected 290 tons for a record per capita of 211 pounds.

Pace of the campaign speeded up in other parts of the state. Portland called for 5000 additional men to take part in the mammoth Sunday collection drive. Committeemen estimated more than a thousand tons are in scattered piles about Portland.

Baker county set October 22 as a scrap collection day. The city of Baker will close stores and offices to participate and other towns in the county may follow suit.

Veterans' Group Will Support Harris Ellsworth

EUGENE, Oct. 17 (AP)—Formation of a war veterans' committee to support Harris Ellsworth, republican nominee for congress from the newly created fourth district was announced Friday by Ben Dorris, Springfield orchardist, chairman.

"It is time that the veterans of this country should insist that their program, calling for preparedness for war, be put into effect," Norris asserted. "They should also put into office men who believe in and will work for that program."

NORTHWEST LUMBER HEARING RECESSED

SEATTLE, Oct. 17 (AP)—Northwest lumber industry employers are expected to present their case in a dispute with the International Woodworkers of America (C O) when the war labor board's Pacific coast lumber commission reopens hearings at Portland October 26.

The hearings were recessed yesterday after four full days testimony by union leaders who are asking a minimum wage of 95 cents an hour in northwest camps employing an estimated 35,000 IWA members.

Jerry Simpson, economics adviser of the Pacific coast labor bureau, was the last witness heard yesterday. He cited decisions of the WLB in favor of stabilizing wages in accordance with pay scales of competing industries such as shipyards and aviation plants and offered voluminous exhibits and wage data.

The commission will establish permanent headquarters in Portland.

WHEAT FALLS CENT ON FLOUR REPORT

CHICAGO, Oct. 17 (AP)—Wheat prices fell about a cent a bushel soon after the opening today as a result of selling blamed on a Washington report that flour price ceilings may not be changed materially from present levels but the market quickly recovered its loss and closed higher than yesterday.

Buying of previous short sellers occurred on the rally. Some of wheat's strength was borrowed from fractionally higher corn prices, reflecting official indications that farmers would be asked to produce even more hogs next year. Early lows in the wheat pit were lowest in more than a month.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1 cent higher compared with yesterday, December \$1.231-1.24, May \$1.261-1; corn 1-1/2c up, December 80 1/2c, May 85 1/2c; oats unchanged to 1/2c lower; soybeans 1-1/2c higher; rye 1/2c higher.

ALLIED OFFENSIVE IN BURMA LOOMS

NEW DELHI, India, Oct. 17 (AP)—Lieutenant General Joseph W. Stilwell, chief of staff of allied forces in China, arrived from Chungking today and said he would see General Sir Archibald Wavell, British commander-in-chief, in India tomorrow.

The arrival of Stilwell, who directed Chinese forces in the battle of Burma last spring, coincided with growing speculation on prospects of allied attempts at a comeback against the Japanese there.

The belief that some major operation might be developing was strengthened yesterday by the return of General Wavell from an inspection tour which took him across India's Burma frontier.

Western Pine Orders Down During Week

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17 (AP)—Orders were down slightly but production and shipments up in the western pine industry for the week ending October 10, the Western Pine association said Friday.

Orders came to 88,521,000 board feet compared with 106,280,000 for the previous week and 79,370,000 for the same week last year. Shipments: 89,347,000 board feet, 87,917,000 and 92,397,000. Production: 82,748,000 board feet, 91,281,000 and 88,516,000.

BASE ABANDONED

CHUNKING, Oct. 17 (AP)—Sinkings by American and British submarines have forced Japanese warships to abandon use of Camranh bay in Indo-China, according to a fighting Frenchman who recently escaped from that Japanese-occupied French colony.
