Corvallis, Eugene, Albany Keep Records

Axemen Spill Milwaukie, 31-7; Corvallis Humbles Salem Vikings, 33-7

Klamath Falls loomed head and shoulders above other southern Oregon high school football teams today after crushing the usually powerful Medford Pearpickers last night 32-0.

It was the fifth consecutive win for the Pelicans, and stamped them as one of the stronger contenders for the state title.

Other sections had rivals, however, even if their records are less impressive.

Corvallis, Eugene and Albany in the no name league are undefeated and untied. Corvallis humbled Salem, 33-7, the third victory for the Spartans and the third loss for the usually strong Salem team.

Eugene won its first no name league game, spilling Milwaukie, 31-7. Albany, victor over Salem in a close game last week, nosed past Oregon City in a thriller, 19-12.

West Linn continued to show strength in downing Forrest Grove, 21-0, and taking over the Tualatin Yamhill valley league lead. Among the smaller western Oregon schools, Taft won its fourth straight, defeating Newport, 58-6, and Vernonia won its third straight, defeating Rainier, 25-0.

Hood River trailed, 20-7, at halftime at Astoria, then unleashed a passing attack that almost overtook the Fishermen who finally won 27-20.

In Portland Grant took over the city lead by crushing Washington, 25-6. Grant is the only undefeated and untied team. Grant, however, suffered a 15-0 loss at Klamath Falls in early season.

In eastern Oregon Milton-Freewater, after tying three and losing one, finally won, defeating The Dalles, 26-6.

Linfield Stand Holds Pacific To 0-0 Tie

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Oct. 17 (AP)—Stiff goal-line resistance displayed by Linfield college stopped a hard driving Pacific university team three times yesterday as the squads fought a scoreless northwest conference football battle.

Using a consistent passing attack, Pacific drove once to Linfield's one-yard stripe. Both squads resorted heavily to passes but neither could make them pay off.

Linfield never threatened.

Coach Myers Finds Out About His Squad; Draft And Missed Interception Tells Story

Bears-Giant Clash Tops Pro Slate

Contest is Repeat Performance of 1941 National Professional World Series

NEW YORK, Oct. 17 (AP)—A repeat performance of the 1941 National Football league title game will be played at Wrigley field tomorrow with the Chicago Bears, defending loop and western divisional champions, opposing the New York Giants, eastern titleholders of a year ago.

In the title game last fall the Bears won, 37 to 9, and are the favorites to repeat Sunday.

The Chicago Cardinals, riding on the passing combination of Bud Schwenk and Steve Lach, encounter the Detroit Lions for a second time this season. In their first struggle the Cards won, 13 to 0.

In other games, Cleveland tangles with Green Bay while Sammy Baugh and his Washington Redskins mates are at Brooklyn and Bill Dudley and the re-viving Pittsburgh Steelers bump into the Philadelphia Eagles.
