BOSTON, Oct. 19 (AP-USA)—The Boston wool market was quiet today. Sales were made of small quantities at unchanged prices. Scored three-eighths bleached wool was sold at \$1.12. Texas 12-months wools of average French combing lengths were sold at a cleaned price of \$1.17. Forty cents was paid for fall wools estimated to shrink 58 per cent. Sales of fine cross-bred wools for the account of U. S. dealers were reported in Buenos Aires.
