OLD TIME BAKED BEANS
 2 cups white beans
 1/4 pound fat salt pork or bacon sliced
 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 1/2 cup granulated or brown sugar

2 tablespoons molasses, more or less
 1/2 teaspoon mustard
 2 tablespoons catsup, if desired
 1 small onion, if desired

Wash beans; cover with 2 quarts water and soak overnight. Cook slowly until skins burst or until just tender. Drain. Place half the beans in an earthenware bean pot or casserole. Bury part of pork in beans and add half of combined remaining ingredients. Add remaining beans and seasonings. Place remaining pork over top. Cover with boiling water. Cover and bake in slow oven (250 degrees to 300 degrees) 6 to 8 hours. When necessary, add water. Serves 6-8.

HAM AND LIMA BEANS
 1 pound dried lima beans
 1/4 cup prepared mustard
 3 tablespoons sugar or molasses

1/8 teaspoon black pepper
 2 sliced onions
 4 to 5 pounds smoked ham, shoulder or half

Wash beans and soak overnight in heavy kettle in water to cover. Next day add more water to cover or if ham has been parboiled use ham broth. Add seasonings and onion, mix. Place ham on beans and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) one hour. Remove ham rind, bake 1 hour longer or until ham is tender and beans absorb liquid. Makes 6 servings and enough ham for another meal.
