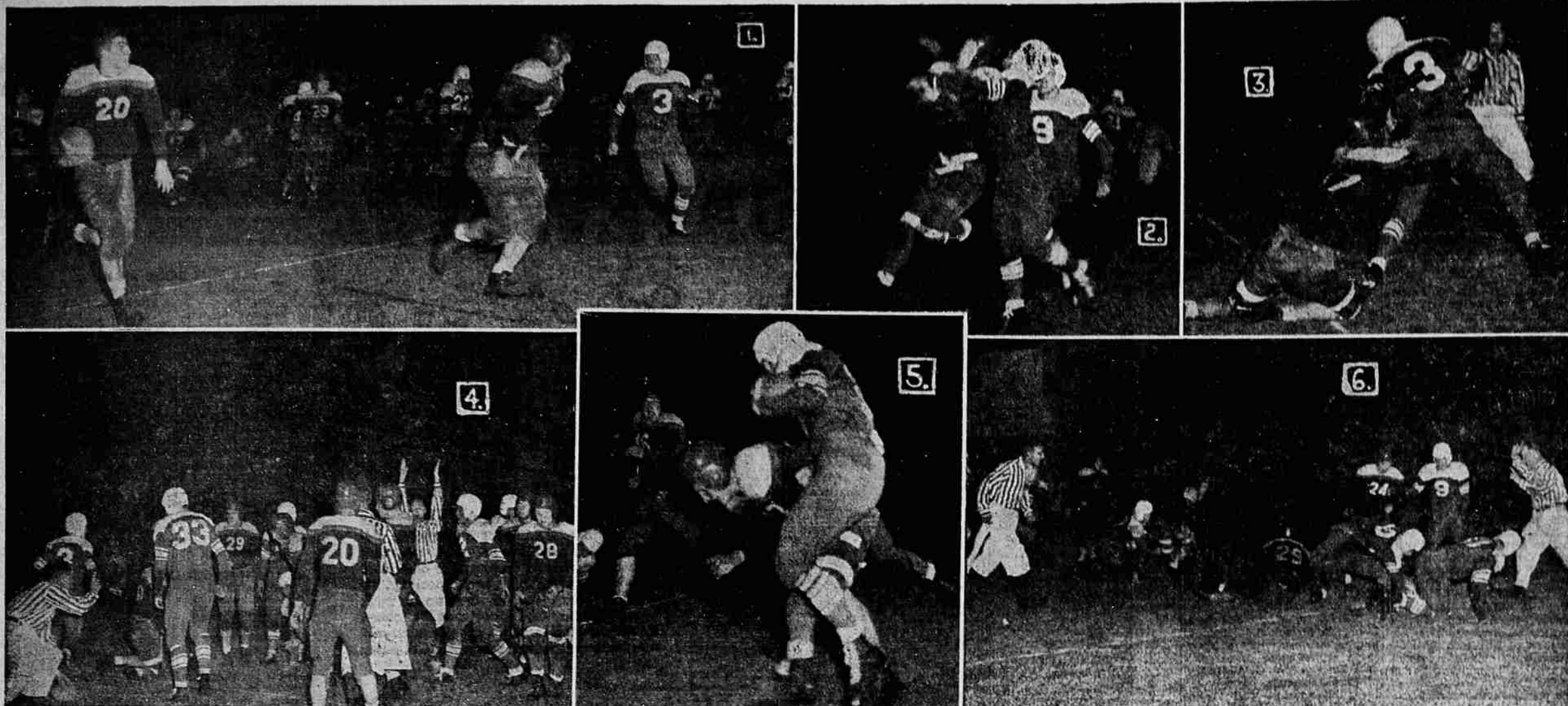


KLAMATH FALLS - MEDFORD GAME PICTURES.



Here's how the Klamath Pelicans earned their third victory in 28 years over the Medford Tigers, 32-0, on the Medford gridiron last Friday night. Picture No. 1—Hal Adams, Medford halfback sweeps around right end after reversing his field. There's a blocker in front of him but Ralph Foster, Pelican's No. 3, finally downed him. The picture is notable in that 18 players, or parts of them, are visible. Identifiable numbers are: left to right, 32, Anderson of Medford; Adams; 47, Dippel of Medford; 29, Montieth of Medford; 30, Blohm of Klamath; 22, Vaillancour of Klamath, and Foster. Picture No. 2—Pelican Fullback Don Mast and another Pelican halt a Medford runner. Twelfth Men Follow Crisler's Teams, And They're Going from Bad to Worse

Twelfth men are going from bad to worse, and I am getting a bit tired of seeing spectators enter the lineup. They seem to follow teams coached by me.

The first one actually stopped the play. The second hit the runner, but could not stop him. The third didn't even get a chance to show what he could do.

In 1933, with my unbeaten Princeton team mightily near the Dartmouth goal-line, a spectator leaped from the stands and took his place in the Green line.

By accident, his timing was so perfect that he reached his position a split second before the ball was snapped.

He plugged the exact hole through which the play was supposed to go and stopped it short of a touchdown. The officials got him out of there, and Princeton scored its only touchdown to win, 7-0.

Tom Harmon scored 28 points in our opener against California at Berkeley in '40. Harmon scored three times on long runs in the first half. On the third one a bald-headed, slightly inebriated fan attempted to tackle him five yards from the goal. He hit him, but did not prevent the score.

In the fourth quarter of our final with Ohio State in Michi-

gan stadium last fall, an inebriated customer raced from his seat in the end zone half the length of the field to take a place in the Michigan backfield.

Tommy Kuzma let him have one, and four policemen lugged him off the field.

War Travel Difficulty Cuts Gates

Grid Attendance Off 25 Per Cent, Survey Shows; Small Town Schools Hit

NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (AP)—Transportation and the war already have reduced college football attendance an average of 25 per cent, it is revealed by an Associated Press survey of 44 of the nation's leading colleges.

The schools hardest hit, of course, are those situated far from large centers of population and off the main rail lines. In other seasons special trains made it possible for the fans to move in on these out-of-the-way spots in great numbers. Many in the east drove in their own cars. But under present restrictions it is no small experience to reach some of the remote campuses and get back home on the same weekend.

Through last Saturday, the 44 schools checked had played 127 games to a total of 2,296,797 spectators. A year ago the same number of home games for the same teams drew 3,028,955 fans. The decrease has been a general one, though some schools have been hit harder than others.

Cornell has experienced the sharpest drop. Situated at Ithaca in upstate New York, the Big Red has drawn only 19,587 to its first three games, as against 49,070 a year ago.

Herb Bishop, fourth in scoring in the northern division last year, may be moved from center to forward this season with tall Bob Sheridan, letterman, taking over the pivot post. Senior Owen Hunt will add scoring punch along with Juniors Scott Witt and Al Akins.

Returning to the team after a one-year layoff is Phil Mahan, reserve on the Cougar team of 1941, which lost to Wisconsin in the national finals.

Mountain Infantry Seeks Men

Skiers, Trappers, Guides, Climbers, Packers Needed

Selection of personnel for service with mountain forces, popularly known as the ski troops of the United States army, suspended on July 8, has been resumed, the National Ski association disclosed today.

The association again has been given the privilege of recommending men, as it had from the start, for the 87th mountain infantry, the first mountain regiment to be activated.

Men who have lived and worked in the mountains, the association said, such as rock climbers, trappers, packers, guides, prospectors and timber cruisers are preferred. If they ski, so much the better. Good skiers, according to NSA, without extensive mountaineering experience, if they are physically fit for rigorous winter and mountain training, will be acceptable.

The association said it would be glad to consider the applications of any young men who can show evidence of exceptional fitness as raw material, even though they have had no broad mountain experience. No candidate need be a member of the National Ski association or of any ski or mountain club.

Place your right forearm under his jaw.

Twist his head to the left, grasp your own wrist and pull upward on his jaw and downward on the top of his head (2).
This will easily break his neck.

They were accompanied by Fred P. Cronemiller, assistant regional forester in charge of wildlife and range management of the California region.

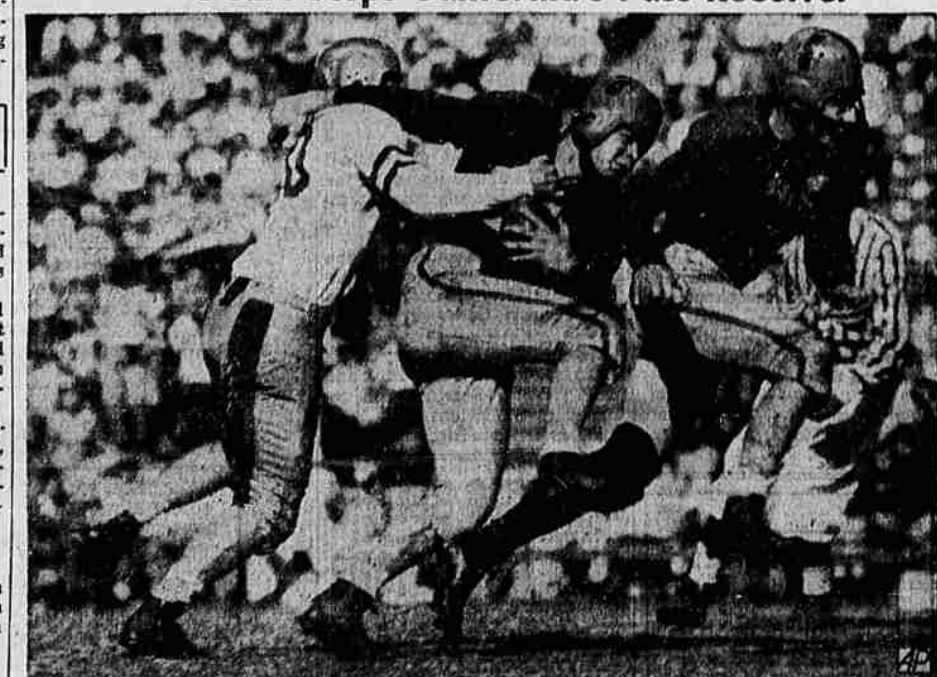
While here they conferred concerning wildlife problems with E. P. Cliff, supervisor of the Fremont forest.
