RAF RAIDERS SWEEP OVER EUROPE

In The Day's News

THERE isn't much in the way of definite development today, but the news winds are full of straws.

THE most interesting of these straws (especially to us of the Pacific Coast) is the announcement from London that Britain has sent a powerful battle squadron, including at least three battleships, the aircraft carrier Illustrious and a large force of cruisers and destroyers, into the Indian ocean.

The disposition of naval forces of such size and fighting power is normally a closely guarded military secret, so we are justified in assuming that there must be a reason for the London announcement.

A fair guess would be that it is intended for the Japs.

RECALL here the intimations, contained in our own naval communiques of the past couple of weeks, to the effect that the Japs have been concentrating heavy naval forces within striking distance of the Solomons.

How heavy?

For what purpose?

How much naval strength HAVE WE available in the Pacific with which to oppose such a Jap concentration?

These questions have been in all our minds, but have remained unanswered.

THE announcement of the presence of a powerful British battle squadron in the Indian ocean, coupled with outspoken hints in the past few days of an impending allied (British-American) drive into Burma may be the answer.

It is notice to the Japs to go slow.

FOR months the Japs have been suspiciously quiet. Considering the strength at their command, they have been fighting with one hand tied behind them. Even their recent counter-attack in the Solomons appeared to be on a relatively small scale—relative, that is, to the total strength they could bring to bear if they were willing to risk an all-out smash.

They haven't attacked Siberia. They haven't followed through in the Aleutians.

NATURALLY, one wonders why.

It is just possible that between us and the British we have bluffed them out of an all-out attack at ONE POINT by inspiring fears as to what we might be able to do to them at ANOTHER POINT.

If so, we have gained time, which we NEED.

THIS is admittedly wishful thinking, which is always dangerous. But it might explain why for months they have been

WHITE HELD IN FORT KLAMATH INDIAN DEATH

Foster Barkley Found Dead in Street of Blow on Head

Earl Milton Jackson, 47, of Pine Ridge, was lodged in the Klamath county jail today pending complete investigation of the death of Foster Barkley, 48-year-old Chillicothe Indian, found dead on the street in Fort Klamath last night.

District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore said a report by County Coroner George H. Adler showed that Barkley died of a cerebral hemorrhage caused by a blow by a blunt instrument "at the base of the head and a little to the right." The report, Sisemore asserted, said that a wound one and one-half inches in diameter was found. The blow, according to the report, could have been made by a ball-headed hammer or a rock or the wound caused by the head striking a rock.

Deputy District Attorney Clarence Humble said that no definite details surrounding Barkley's death were available but that the Indian was found early Thursday evening on the street.

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Tire Program To Be Announced By November 15

DETROIT, Oct. 23 (AP)—The government's plan to provide tires for all motorists—but on a rigidly controlled basis—probably will be made known by November 15, according to informed automotive sources.

The program, predicated upon the reduction of driving to little more than the absolutely essential, will be made possible by a substantial increase in the production of re-processed or reclaimed rubber casings.

As currently contemplated, production of reclaimed rubber tires of not more than four ounces of new rubber each may reach 25,000,000 units during the 12 months ending October 31, 1943.

To these may be added something like 6,000,000 tires expected to be turned over by car owners in the present collection of excess holdings and perhaps as many more from stocks of new casings on hand

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Seattle Draft Boards Stop Induction of Married Men

SEATTLE, Oct. 23 (AP)—The Seattle area's 12 selective service boards announced today that, despite orders from headquarters in Washington, D. C., they have stopped inducting married men into the army. They said the decision was made unanimously by the chairman of the 12 local boards.

In a letter addressed to Rep. Warren G. Magnuson and Senators Homer T. Bone and Mon C. Wallgren (D-Wash.) they stated:

"The boards in this area are determined that the men of Seattle shall be accorded the same treatment that is accorded the men of New York City, Philadelphia and St. Louis.

FDR ASKS PASSAGE OF TEEN AGE DRAFT

Requests No Restrictive Amendments Be Attached

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—President Roosevelt urged today senate approval of pending legislation to draft 18 and 19-year-old men without any restrictive amendments.

In a letter read on the floor by Senator Gurney (R-S. D.), author of the selective service bill, the president said that complicated administrative duties involved in the handling of a large number of men in the army made it imperative that no restrictions be placed on the use of the youthful draftees after they are inducted.

Gurney read the president's letter while the senate was considering an amendment proposed by Senator Norris (Ind.-Neb.) which would require that selectees under 19 years old be guaranteed under 19 years old be guaranteed

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Mrs. Roosevelt Arrives in Britain With WAAC Head

LONDON, Oct. 23 (AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, the guest of Britain's king and queen, arrived in Britain today accompanied by Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, director of the WAACS.

After a brief, smiling chat with their majesties at the railroad station where Mrs. Roosevelt presented Mrs. Hobby to Queen Elizabeth and, in turn, herself met Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, the first lady drove away with the British rulers amid the cheers of a crowd.

Mrs. Roosevelt's arrival after flying the Atlantic was announced by Buckingham palace with the explanation that she came, on royal invitation, "to gain first hand knowledge of British women's war activities and to visit United States forces in Great Britain."

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BRITISH SHIPS DISPATCHED TO INDIAN OCEAN

Jap Drive In Solomons Appears Thrown Off Schedule

A second Japanese attack on the west wing of the Guadalcanal line has been thrown back by U. S. soldiers and marines, the navy disclosed today, in a communique which indicated that the enemy had also put troops ashore on Russell island, 30 miles northwest of Guadalcanal in the Solomons.

U. S. divebombers attacked the dispositions on Russell island, it was stated. Meanwhile the Americans maintained their staunch defense of Guadalcanal airfield, destroying 12 raiding aircraft in two days.

Large Force

Yank Bombers Strike Far to North in China

CHUNGKING, Oct. 23 (AP)—United States army bombers, striking far north in China, caused "serious damage" with many high explosive and incendiary bombs on the Linsai mine installations in Hopeh province, a communique from Lieut. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced today.

All the American planes returned to their bases, it said.

The communique said: "On the afternoon of October 21 United States army force bombers carried out a most successful attack on the Linsai mine installations (Kailan mining administration near Ku Yuen, Hopeh).

"Both high explosive and incendiary bombs were used.

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Reynolds Advocates 57-Hour Work Week, No Foreign Labor

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—Chairman Reynolds (D-N.C.) of the senate military committee today advocated boosting the standard work week to 57 hours and eliminating premium pay for overtime as an immediate solution for labor shortages.

Shortly after Reynolds was interviewed, the committee, absorbed in the 'teen-age draft bill debate on the senate floor, decided to postpone until Monday its questioning of high government officials on the need for national service legislation. Secretary of War Stimson was listed as the headline among next week's witnesses.

Chairman Donald Nelson of the war production board and Brig. Gen. Frank J. McSherry, director of operations for the war manpower commission, had been slated to testify today.

Liquor Control For Service Men Eyed at Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23 (AP)—The army, navy and liquor control commissions of Oregon, Washington, Utah, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming huddled here today in a closed meeting to discuss a uniform code of liquor regulations for service men on leave.

Administrator L. F. Allen of the Oregon commission presided. The press was excluded.

4 COUNTRIES FEEL FURY OF GREAT BOMBERS

Germany, France, Italy, Holland Hit In Forays

LONDON, Oct. 23—The swift-striking new Mosquito and heavier Wellington bombers of the RAF struck in daylight today against targets on Germany and occupied Holland, the British announced tonight.

An authoritative statement said that Spitfires and United States-built Mustangs also made low-level attacks on objectives in northern France.

Italy Bombed

Such attacks have become a part of the daylight bombing pattern of the RAF. Silence of the German-controlled Hilversum radio in the Netherlands from 1:30 to 3:15 p. m. earlier had indicated that allied raiders again were over the continent in daylight.

The mighty bomber arm of the RAF reached across the Alps last night to strike the Italian homeland its heaviest air blow of the war, hitting Genoa with such a weight of explosives that even Rome conceded "great damage."

Turin, the fascist arsenal city in the north, also was hit but apparently the chief assault fell on the harbor and industries of Genoa, Italy's big northern Mediterranean port.

Devastation Sampled

The air ministry mentioned "a strong force of air-craft," but did not disclose just how many planes were in it.

But the Italian communique spoke of the "notable dimensions" of the assault and Hitler's axis partner now apparently has sampled the fiery devastation with which the huge four-motored bombers of the RAF have been scouring the reich week after week.

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Allies Drive Ahead Along Guinea Front

SOMEWHERE IN NEW GUINEA, Oct. 23 (Delayed) (AP)—Allied troops drove through heavy tropical rains and over rugged, slippery mountain trails in the Owen Stanley mountains today to a point about nine miles south of Kokoda.

Fighting continued between forward elements of the allies and the enemy in the heights of the Owen Stanleys along the main track north of the village of Eora creek, but the downpour and severe weather hampered operations.

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Nazis Threaten Force in Request for French Labor

VICHY, Oct. 23 (AP)—The threat of force was invoked by German occupation authorities in Paris as they stepped up their efforts today to recruit skilled French workers for labor in Germany's war industries.

Issuance of the threat by the German commander for greater Paris followed the non-appearance of a group of workers directed to appear at a railway station yesterday for transportation to the reich.

Another batch of workers immediately was ordered to report today, along with the warning that those who failed to heed the instructions would "expose themselves to forceful measures."
