MISS HUDSON LEAVES FOR WAAC SERVICE

FORT KLAMATH — Fort Klamath residents bid good-bye last week to Miss Avera B. Hudson, who left Friday for Portland, to entrain with the Women's Army Auxiliary corps. Miss Hudson and Mrs. Elliott, who is from Klamath Falls, were among the first from Klamath county to volunteer for service with the WAACs.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., where her parents still reside, Miss Hudson attended school there, and following graduation from the Tuscaloosa county high school, she went to New Orleans, La., where she took a business course at Spencer's Business college. Following its completion, she was employed for five years in a real estate office in New Orleans, after which she returned to her home in Alabama and spent two years at Tuscaloosa with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. K. D. Hudson.

She then enrolled for nurses' training at Brice hospital in Tuscaloosa, and this spring decided to come to Fort Klamath to keep house for her brother, James T. Hudson, who is employed as timber scaler by the Algoma Lumber company in its local woods operations. In addition to keeping house for her brother, Miss Hudson was employed also at Balou's general store here.

She had planned when she came north this spring to return to Tuscaloosa when logging was suspended for the season this fall and complete the year and a half of her nurses' training period, but changed her mind and decided to enter the service of her country with the WAACs instead.

Miss Hudson has made many friends during her stay here, and Fort Klamath is proud of its only "lady soldier."

Last year the average wage earner, driving for necessary purposes, made 385 trips covering 3782 miles.
