

DR. POWELL TO HOLD SERIES AT LOCAL CHURCH

The First Baptist church, Eighth and Washington streets, has scheduled Dr. R. L. Powell for a series of evangelistic services November 2 to 15.

Dr. Powell is pastor of the Temple Baptist church of Tacoma, Wash. The Rev. Cecil C. 14,868 VOTERS ON SISKIYOU ROLLS

YREKA, Calif.—Siskiyou county now has 14,868 eligible voters on the rolls for the November 3 election, County Clerk Waldo Smith revealed today, but added that probably not more than 12,000 of these are actually in the county and able to cast their ballots.

The total figure, Smith pointed out, includes hundreds of men who have gone into the armed services, and many families which have moved from Siskiyou to one of the defense areas.

At the primary election, approximately a 60 per cent vote was cast. More than 500 new voters have registered since the primary.
