

Reports Stress Cooperation

Soroptimists Bring Reports From Conference Stressing National Objective in War

Conference reports were continued at the Soroptimist luncheon Thursday noon, with Mrs. Rose Poole acting as program chairman. Preceding the reports a clever skit entitled "The Four Horsemen," founded upon the Apocalypse, was presented by the defense committee of the club. Each week this committee forcefully brings to the minds of the members that cooperation in all defense works is the outstanding objective of club life this year.

Mrs. W. E. Lamm reviewed the extension forum conducted at the Tacoma conference by

Mrs. Lois Biel Sandall. Mrs. Poole gave an outline of the Venture forum under the leadership of Mary Boyle of Portland. Klamath Falls reported on this program that the first WAVE commissioned from Oregon, Washington or Idaho was Lauretta O'Brien from the Klamath Falls Venture club.

Mrs. Harriet Tyler was the speaker at the evening banquet, taking for her subject "God Bless America." Anna Sprott, immediate past federation president, was the guest speaker at the Sunday morning breakfast, building her talk around "Victory in Service."

President Coral Sabo particularly stressed the thought brought out by one brave Soroptimist who, with three sons in the service and who had lost one three weeks prior to the conference, said that everything which did not lend itself to the national program of defense must be shelved until the war is won.

"All objectives," said President Sabo, "must be built around the national efforts. The local club is at present investigating an opportunity to render a much needed service to the community in line with this objective and a full report is expected from the committee in charge within the next few weeks."

A letter was read by the president, from Elizabeth Hawes, liaison secretary of the International Federation of Soroptimist clubs, thanking the Klamath Falls club for the gift of tea sent early this spring, which reached London some weeks ago. "I am keeping the tins intact," wrote Miss Hawes, "as they will keep, and it is so useful to have something in the store for the contingencies which are sure to arise with the colder weather. I cannot tell you how much your kindness touches us all nor can I begin to describe to you what a cup of tea means on fire fighting or air raid nights."

Another letter from Miss Hawes told of the disposition of funds provided by the club some months ago. At one time the evacuation of the children of British Soroptimist homes in the United States had been undertaken, but owing to submarine warfare was abandoned. When, upon government decision, the project was abandoned, funds from all clubs were left to the disposal of each club. Klamath members voted that half of their donation be left for use at the discretion of the liaison secretary, the balance to be returned to the club. Miss Hawes wrote that the gift is being used to help those stricken by the war.

"I have been to a number of the stricken areas and spoken to many of the recipients to whom your funds came as a godsend in their hour of acute physical and mental distress," she wrote. "I am specially glad to tell you that a number of our members were able to buy new equipment and start work again at once, thanks to your generosity."

Mrs. Isabelle Brixner, county school supervisor, spoke briefly to the club on Thursday on the merits of the Basic School bill which will provide that some of the excess funds from the income tax be used to lower real property tax by applying them on the school expenses of all districts.
