Leaves Saved Now Will Be Fertilizer

The victory gardener who burns leaves this fall and then complains about how hard it is to get fertilizer in the spring is just as shortsighted as the farmer who burns his stubble and straw and then complains about lowered crop yields. That, at least, is the opinion of O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist, who is the author of a recently issued extension circular No. 387, which gives directions for using all available leaves and other plant materials this fall to make compost for next year's victory garden.

Leaves and similar material are good even if merely spread on the garden area and turned under for organic matter, but they are much more valuable if used to make a compost pile this fall which can be used next spring the same as barnyard manure. The circular gives complete directions for making a compost pile, the success of small amount of commercial fertilizer depends upon adding a tilizer and enough moisture to promote rapid decomposition.

Puget Sound Pulp Mills Shut Down On WPB Orders

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26 (AP)—The war production board today ordered the shutdown of three big pulp mills on Puget sound and prohibited all shipments of pulp from the Pacific coast to the east except the types used for explosives and rayon. Both actions take effect November 1.

No domestic paper pulp of any grade may move east in November, WPB said, and "there is every prospect that west coast shipments may be eliminated for the duration, with the exception of deliveries for essential war purposes."
