

R. H. LAMOTT TO TAKE OVER SCOUT DUTIES

Robert H. Lamott, assistant Boy Scout executive in San Diego for the past five and one-half years, has been selected as executive of the Modoc council and will take over his duties November 15. It has been learned here.

Lamott spent the weekend here and after making arrangements with the local council returned south to complete his work with the San Diego office.

The new executive, who takes over duties previously conducted by Dwight Gilchrist, now in the United States navy, is 30 years old, has a wife and a daughter, 5, and a son, 2. He was born in Los Angeles, attended school at Van Nuys, Calif., graduated from UCLA in 1933 after majoring in social science.

Camp Interests

Lamott entered Boy Scout work in March, 1934, with the Salt Lake council. From Salt Lake he went to San Diego, where he has been since that time. For a number of years Lamott did voluntary Boy Scout work, served as scoutmaster, district commissioner with the San Fernando Valley council, and also as a camp director. In preparing for Scout work, Lamott attended the Boy Scout national training school in Mendham, N. J.

One of Lamott's chief interests is in Boy Scout camp. He said he considered scouting most important now than ever in training the youth of the nation for their responsibilities as citizens.

FORT KLAMATHITES PITCH INTO SCRAP

"Get in the scrap" was taken to heart by Fort Klamathites Sunday and a concentrated drive in that area resulted in some 12 tons of scrap metal turned over to a collection crew made up of Hugh Cole, Jack Watson, Reynolds Morgan and C. C. Jenkins of this city.

Four county trucks collected the scrap from fields, barnyards, and ranch lawns throughout the day. The amount garnered Sunday is "about half" of the scrap available in that district and a second trip is planned soon, Jenkins stated.

Charles Race, principal of Fort Klamath school, made all arrangements for the collection and when the trucks arrived the drivers were assisted in locating the metal by several Fort Klamath boys and Mrs. Race. Much credit goes to farmers and school boys of the community, Jenkins stated.

When trucks go back a second time they will attempt to bring down an electric motor in the town, and a big boiler at the Ray Loosley ranch. Eleven collections were made Sunday.

WOMEN URGED TO ENLIST NOW IN ARMY CORPS

Qualified women clerks, cooks, typists, duty leaders and administrative specialists are wanted immediately for enrollment in the women's army auxiliary corps to replace soldiers urgently needed elsewhere for combat duty. Lieutenant-Colonel B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer for Oregon, announced Saturday.

Applicants who desire the opportunities afforded for extra training as well as adventure and patriotic service, were advised to apply at their nearest army recruiting station.

Non-Specialist Jobs

To qualify, they must be 21 to 45 years of age, citizens without dependents, and evidence qualifications under the particular classification. Following a short period on reserve, enrollees will be forwarded to Fort Des Moines, Ia., for military training and final assignment.

The colonel stated that in addition large numbers of women are still needed for enrollment unassigned to undergo basic training with a view to filling countless posts not requiring specialist backgrounds. The local army recruiting office is located in room 219 Post Office building.

Three Little Negro Boys Are Home--Officers Hope

Three little stair-stepped negro boys, aged 12, 14 and 15, but with adult imaginations, were safely home with their mama in Renton, Wash., today—or so local juvenile officers hoped because they had some time getting them there.

The tale of the tall-story triumvirate started a couple of weeks back when Constable Ed Davis of Merrill found them working in a potato field and sleeping in the Merrill FSA camp. The word "working" is used lightly, for the trio was more prone to depend on the offerings of kindly FSA neighbors for food.

They told Davis they were from Pasco, Wash., and they were down here to earn enough money to buy their mother a refrigerator.

A sentimental story but it failed to check with information, or the lack of it, from Pasco. Authorities there said they had no record of such a family.

Harold Hendrickson, Klamath county juvenile officer, couldn't shake a better one out of the lads, however, so he left them with Mrs. C. M. Timms, negro woman in Klamath Falls, pending more searching investigation.

Meantime, several days had elapsed and the boys still needed that refrigerator.

So we find them in Keno where they're assertedly from Topeka, Kas., seeking money with which to buy their mother a refrigerator.

Simultaneously, or hard by, a general inquiry has brought forth the information that Jesse, Joe and James Perkins, sons of Mrs. Charlotte Perkins of Renton, Wash., are somewhere in the Pacific northwest, but not in Renton. And would the finders please return?

Confronted at last with accuracy, Jesse, 12; Joe 14, and James, 15, allowed they were from Renton and would the finders please return.

Hendrickson, et al, put them aboard a bus bound northward and crossed their fingers.

That was several days ago. But they can uncross 'em now. A late bulletin reveals they're back in Renton, and with their mother. But mama is still waiting for a cold spell.

AP ANSWERS U. S. ANTI-TRUST SUIT

NEW YORK, Oct. 28 (AP)—The Associated Press, charged with monopoly by the United States government, Tuesday answered the anti-trust suit against it with a denial of the charges, and said that if deprived of its right to choose its members, the assurance of an impartial and unbiased news report would no longer exist.

"If the news gathered through the cooperative facilities of AP and its members," the answer said, "were required to be made available to everyone, whether a member or not, the incentive of each member to contribute his time, effort and money to the upbuilding of an organization for the mutual benefit of himself and of others making a like contribution would disappear."

"It is the fundamental law of the land," the answer continued, "that no statute shall be construed as to abridge the freedom of the press. A free press requires that newspapers shall be free to collect and distribute the news and that they shall be free to choose their associates in so doing."

"This right is now challenged by the means of a novel interpretation of the anti-trust statute, which is designed to foster a particular newspaper, to wit, the Chicago Sun."
