Pelicans Meet Undeclared, Twice-Tied Grants Pass Cavemen at Modoc Field

Klamath Falls' powerful Pelicans can win the Southern Oregon conference championship tomorrow and virtually clinch a claim on the state high school football title.

To do this they must defeat the Grants Pass Cavemen, whose record does not equal the Pelicans', but whose stubborn nature might. The Cavemen are undefeated this season, although they have been tied twice.

Both ties, however, were with strong and also undefeated coastal eleven, North Bend and Marshfield.

If the Pelicans can get past the Cavemen, they will have only to down the Bend Lava Bears on Armistice day, and this should prove no great task, since the Bears are practically in hibernation—not a victory to date.

In the Willamette valley undefeated and untied Albany will attempt to protect its No Name league lead from Milwaukie, and Corvallis and Eugene will collide in an attempt to stay on Albany's heels.

In eastern Oregon unbeaten but once-tied La Grande will meet Nampa, Idaho, while Baker and Pendleton vie in a Blue Mountain conference game.

Other games: Unbeaten West Linn vs. Tigard; unbeaten Marshfield vs. Coquille; The Dalles at Hood River; Eureka at Medford; Seaside at Rainier; Seaside at Astoria; Cottage Grove at Roseburg; Sweet Home at Lebanon; Salem at Bend; McMinnville at Beaverton; Forest Grove at Newberg; Sherwood at Hillsboro; Silverton at Chemawa.

Alabama, Georgia Close Go

ATLANTA, Oct. 29 (AP)—A capacity crowd of 32,000 will see undefeated Alabama and Georgia risk their records here Saturday in a game that has even the opposing coaches ready to flip a coin on the outcome.

Brace the first 10 men you see on the street and five of them will pick Alabama while the other half like Georgia—and nine will offer you their bank book for a ticket to the brawl.

The stadium at Atlanta's Grant field was sold out nearly a month ago. Only once in five games, including the Tennessee, Mississippi State and Kentucky encounters, has the opposition crossed Alabama's goal. Mississippi State scored on a fourth period pass in the second game of the season.

Conversely, Georgia has lost 39 points to Kentucky, Furman, Mississippi and Cincinnati, most of them coming when reserves dominated the Bulldog lineup.

Oregon Frosh Get Laddie Gale As Basketball Coach

EUGENE, Oct. 29 (AP)—Laddie Gale of University of Oregon's only national championship basketball club will return to the campus as freshman basketball coach this year.

Gale, named for national All-Star honors in his junior and senior years and record-breaking northern division scorer in 1938, was named to the post yesterday.

He played on the Oregon club that won the NCAA title in 1939.

Football Offensive On Upswing

Steuber of Missouri Leads With 434-Yard Average Per Game During Six Contests

CHICAGO, Oct. 29 (AP)—College football is streaking to new offensive heights this year on the backs of Missouri and Georgia.

Missouri, paced by Bob Steuber, the nation's leading scorer, has averaged 434 yards a game for six contests. Georgia, led by Frankie Sinkwich, has rolled along at a 431 clip in the same number of encounters.

The American football statistical bureau, in releasing today's figures, said that it believed it had some imposing figures three years ago when Cornell, in six games averaged 409 yards before bumping into Dartmouth and Pennsylvania.

But today Missouri and Georgia not only are far ahead of that pace, but are being pushed by two other eleven. In five games, Tulsa has a 419 total offensive average and Ohio State, 414.

Missouri and Ohio State, incidentally, are the two top running teams of the nation, Missouri having gained 2023 of its 2605 total yardage by rushing and Ohio States 1646 of its 2070.

Georgia, 13th in rushing, is making up its difference in passing where it continues to run third behind Columbia and Tulsa. Columbia has averaged 212 yards a game, Tulsa 209, and Georgia 184, with Maryland right behind at 182.

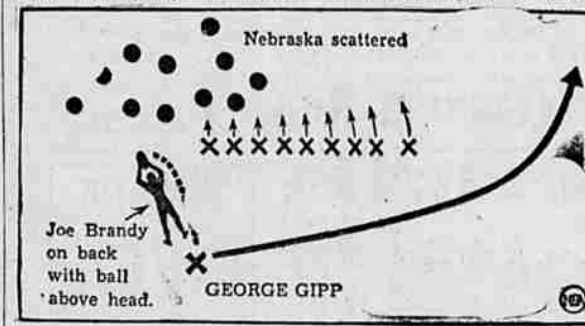
Brandy Wasn't Hurt, But Man Offside Nullifies George Gipp's Touchdown Run

Joe Brandy was to get the ball on the quarterback sneak when Notre Dame was on the left side of the field, and go as far as he could. If he was brought down, he was to pretend he was injured.

The situation arose in Notre Dame's game with Nebraska in 1919. Brandy lay on his back writhing from side to side and



groaning with both hands on the ball and the ball over his head and on the ground.

The Nebraska players were scattered all over. The other members of the Notre Dame team lined up on the line of scrimmage to the right of where Brandy fell—all except the immortal George Gipp, who stood about five yards back, hands on hips, looking at the team's leader moaning on the ground.

"Are you badly hurt, Joe?" asked Gipp. "No," replied Brandy, as he tossed the ball to Gipp, who swept to the right for an easy touchdown.

The irony of it all was that after this had been so carefully planned, and we had practiced it all week, the officials called it back because one of our men was offside.

Gopher-Wildcat Struggle Seen As Real Battle

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 29 (AP)—Although Northwestern is a four-time loser this year, Minnesota can expect a real battle from Lynn Waldorf's eleven when the teams clash here Saturday, if the records mean anything.

Since Waldorf took over at Evanston in 1935, the Wildcats have defeated Minnesota three times, with the first victory, in 1936, ending the Gophers' string of 21 straight wins and 28 without a defeat.

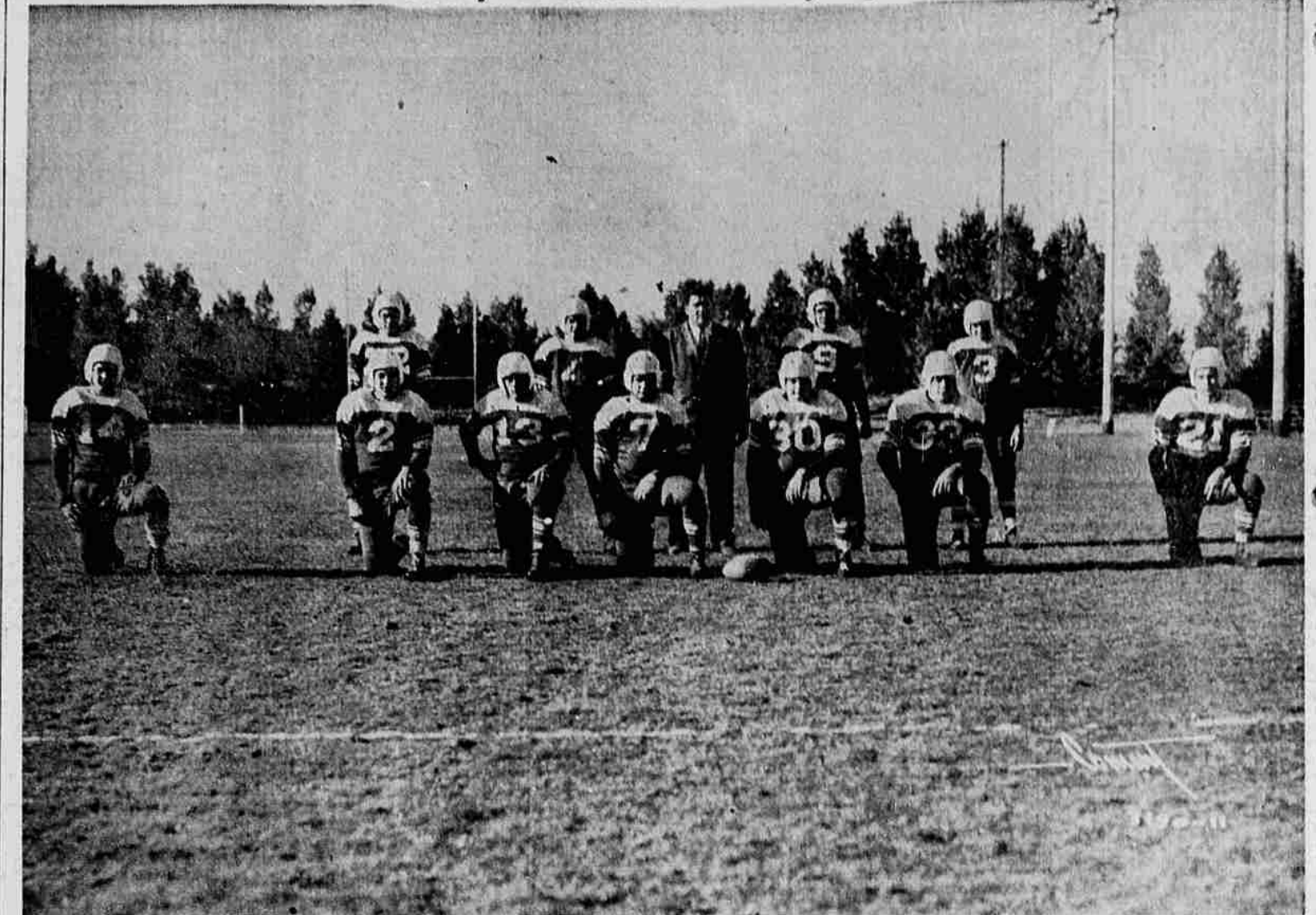
Those three wins give Northwestern the best record of any of Minnesota's opponents in the past seven years.
