

# ANNUAL SCHOOL CARNIVAL OUT IN WAR-TIME

MERRILL—War time is revolutionizing school activities, according to E. E. Kilpatrick, principal of the high school, who announced this week that the annual school carnival that has meant money in the treasury for extra-curricular activities is "out" this year.

Vacations, too, the rest of the year, will be affected by the four-week harvest vacation, with students looking forward to only one day for the Christmas holiday. Thursday and Friday will be set aside for the Thanksgiving holiday and plans must be worked out to make up lost time in some other way since Oregon school laws call for 270 days of study.

**No Conference**  
Classes cannot be held Saturdays unless provision is made by legislative action. Some time may be made up by holding classes one hour longer each day, it has been suggested, and one week has been accounted for with the opening of school a week earlier last fall. School officials hope to make up all time before the regular date for closing for the summer vacation.

No district teachers' conference is scheduled for this year. Teachers, however, will attend a meeting Saturday, October 31, of the Klamath County Teachers' association at the Fremont school in Klamath Falls, the session to be instructed on the initiative bill which will be on the ballot in the coming election.

Football schedules also are upset by the emergency closing, and the Merrill Huskies play the first B league game with Malin at Malin Friday. The next weekend, the Henley Hornets come to Merrill and the following week Merrill travels to Bonanza. With only four squads in the league this season, traveling will be cut to a minimum and the season will be cut in half.

Henley, pre-season favorite, is expected to cut the chances for Merrill to repeat on the capture of the county title this year. George Hobbs, coaching the Huskies for the first time this season, will put the best man in the likeliest spot when Friday comes, since lack of practice has thrown the squad out of high gear.

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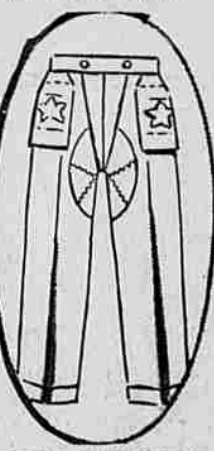
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
