As U. S. Navy losses mounted in the Solomon Island area, news came of the sinking of the 14,700-ton aircraft carrier Wasp after she was hit by three torpedoes from an enemy submarine last Sept. 15. The Wasp, the third announced as lost since the start of the war, is shown aflame before she was abandoned and sunk by torpedoes from a U. S. destroyer. MACHINERY RATION ORDERS IN MAILS

CORVALLIS, Oct. 29 (AP)—New instructions for filing inventories under the farm machinery rationing order will be mailed to all Oregon dealers immediately, R. B. Taylor, state war board chairman, announced today.

The amendment, being supplied by all county committees, greatly simplifies the original request, reducing the types of equipment to be included.

The inventory is to be made as of October 31, the date of the expiration of the original rationing order. It is to be filed with county committees by November 10. Firms covering six counties or more are to file returns with the state war board, while interstate firms will send the report to Washington.

Taylor believes the new rationing program to take effect Nov. 1 will be more inclusive than the present temporary list.

LUMBER BOARD TO HEAR 2 DISPUTES

PORTLAND, Oct. 29 (AP)—Two labor disputes involving seven California lumber companies came before the Pacific coast lumber commission today as an appeal of 70,000 Douglas fir workers for higher pay was recessed.

Final testimony from AFI and CIO representatives of the 70,000 Oregon and Washington sawmill and timber worker was heard yesterday as four cases were grouped into one. The unions were granted one week in which to reply to arguments by employers who opposed a wage increase. An other week will be allowed for filing briefs.

The commission announces that in the meantime it would study a plan for standard pay rates for the same type of work on an industry-wide basis.
