BRITISH HELD TO NO GAIN IN BITTER FIGHT

resistance put up by German and Italian troops." Dispatches from Cairo said the main test was yet to come and that Gen. Montgomery was apparently determined not to repeat the disastrous mistake of last June when the British surged ahead too rapidly and advanced into a deadly ambush of anti-tank guns.

Red Front — Russia—Adolph Hitler's Caucasus armies, in a sudden shift to a new sector, were reported attacking heavily with troops, tanks, artillery and planes against soviet defenses on the Nalchik plateau, 50 miles southwest of the old Mozdok battle sector.

A Berlin broadcast said the Germans had already captured Nalchik, a mountain resort of 13,000 population on the northern slope of the Caucasus chain, only 60 miles from the important Georgian military highway to Tiflis.

Hitler's headquarters said the German siege armies at Stalingrad beat off several Russian counterattacks and then "gained more ground in a workers' settlement and industrial center" in the city's northern suburbs.

GOVERNMENT NEWS RELEASES PLAYED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—Rep. Costello (D-Calif.), a member of the house military committee, declared on the house floor today that "the growing lack of confidence in government news releases is developing a lack of confidence in the effectiveness of our war effort."

He maintained that the "lack of confidence" would be felt in the California elections, "and will adversely affect the democratic party," and said that a similar situation "may develop in other localities such as in indicated in New York."

"It is unfortunate," Costello told his colleagues, "that political consequences should flow from the inept handling of news dissemination."

He reported that "much criticism is daily reaching my desk regarding the tardiness of government news releases concerning our war activities on the various fronts, but more particularly in the southwest Pacific."
