

# DEMOS CHARGE GOP'S WITH ISOLATIONISM

(This is the fourth of five stories about Oregon's General Election.)

SALEM, Oct. 29 (AP)—Oregon's two republican congressmen, Reps. Homer Angell of Portland and James W. Mott of Salem, are charged by their democratic opponents with being isolationists and with hampering America's preparedness before Pearl Harbor.

Angell is the object of the most bitter attack, being charged by State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney of Portland, his democratic opponent, with being a "political pacifist." Mahoney criticized Angell for the latter's vote, only four months before Pearl Harbor, to abolish the draft, his vote against fortifying Guam, and his other votes against administration foreign policy.

Angell, on the other hand, promises to continue to give the president his full support, demands aid for small business, and says he will seek to abolish partisan politics.

Mott's democratic opponent, District Attorney Earl A. Nott of McMinnville, claims Mott is an isolationist because of his votes against extension of the draft, against lifting the arms embargo, and against lend-lease.

Mott, ranking republican on the house naval affairs committee, claims he's the daddy of the two-ocean navy, and that his obtaining the Tongue Point naval base was responsible for the expansion of all of America's Pacific naval bases.

Long Career  
The third major battle involving a congressman is that in eastern Oregon between Rep. Walter M. Pierce, La Grande democrat, and Lowell Stockman, Pendleton republican. This is likely to be the closest race of all, Pierce barely having been renominated.

Pierce, a former governor and former state senator, has had a long career in public life. He says he would continue his full support of the president's war program. Stockman, a dirt farmer, is a former member of the state liquor control commission. He, too, promises to cooperate with the president.

This will be the first election in which Oregon has elected four congressmen, the state having obtained a new district, in southern Oregon.

Cooperation With FDR  
The candidates in the new district are Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg republican, newspaper publisher and state senator, and Edward C. Kelly, Medford democrat, former state representative, and former Oregon chief counsel for the public works administration.

Ellsworth promises to cooperate with the president, advocates

home rule, opposes non-essential spending, and favors free competitive enterprise. Kelly demands cooperation with the president, completion of the Willamette valley project, passage of the Townsend old-age pension bill, and opposes the sales tax.

### Friday Is Last Day for Canning Sugar Issues

No canning sugar will be issued after Friday, October 30, Mrs. Effie Garcelon, executive secretary of the local war price and ration board, warned today.

### Learn to Supplement Your Ration With Gland Meats

Liver, heart, brains, kidneys are all good meats. And they do not come within the type of meat cuts which will be included within your voluntary rationing allowance of 2 1/2 pounds per person a week. Learn how to cook them deliciously. They have valuable nutrients, good flavor and are inexpensive.

**Liver Loaf**  
(8 to 8 servings)  
One and one-half pounds beef liver, scalded and ground, 4 slices bacon (2 slices ground, 2 slices to line the pan), 1 cup ground onion, 1/2 cup farina, 2

teaspoons salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon sage, 1 cup ketchup, 2 eggs, slightly beaten, 1 cup milk.

Mix ground liver and bacon with remaining ingredients. valuable nutrients, good flavor. Place in greased loaf pan with the 2 slices of bacon on bottom as lining. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) until firm, about one hour. Serve with tomato sauce. Cold, slice for sandwiches.

**Kidney and Vegetable Stew**  
(4 servings)  
Three tablespoons barley, water, 14 pounds veal, pork or beef kidney, 2 tablespoons bacon fat, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 8 small whole onions, 6 potatoes, cubed, 8 carrots, quartered, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt.

Soak barley in water to cover for one hour. Soak kidneys in water with one teaspoon salt for one hour; drain, remove skin and fibers and cut kidney in one-inch pieces. Heat bacon fat in kettle. Add kidneys and cook over medium heat for 3 minutes. Add barley and water it was soaked in. Add pepper and remaining salt; cover and simmer for one hour. Add onions; cook 1 hour longer. Then add potatoes, carrots and more water.

## NAZIS QUESTION VESSEL CAPTAIN

The captain of a small Norwegian merchant vessel, torpedoed and sunk off the northern coast of South America in late September, was hauled aboard a German submarine by a line to give particulars about his ship and then released, the navy disclosed today in announcing the sinking. He swam back to the raft and was rescued 16 hours later.

The ship was attacked shortly after midnight, and the vessel sank less than a minute after her boilers were exploded by a torpedo hit on the starboard side, the navy related.

Eight survivors of a crew of 23 were left floundering in the water, and the captain and one seaman managed to reach a floating raft. Others clung to bits of wreckage.

The submarine surfaced and asked for the captain. After being taken aboard the sub, he was quizzed in English by an officer who repeated his answers to the sub commander, also in English.

All eight survivors of the sinking were picked up by a United Nations naval vessel and taken to a South American port.

This sinking and two announced yesterday, one an American ship and the other a British freighter, brought to 507 the Associated Press tabulation of announced united and neutral nations' cargo ship losses in the western Atlantic since last December 7.

## LUMBER COMPANY TRIAL UNDERWAY

PORTLAND, Oct. 29 (AP)—Trial of the Hammond Lumber company, accused of making false representations to obtain logging trucks, continued in federal court today after drivers testified that a company operation near Lebanon could not supply the trucks on the job.

Clifford Barber said he had to wait for loads on the job early this year, and Willis P. Phelps, who had two trucks there, said delays in obtaining loads ran from three to eight hours daily.

The company and its Portland manager, Harry C. Patton, were charged that need for the trucks was falsely portrayed in applications to the war production board and the office of defense transportation.

BERN, Oct. 29 (AP)—The RAF raid upon Milan Saturday night damaged all quarters of the Italian industrial center, started 30 large fires and 300 smaller ones and left 5000 persons homeless, a Swiss telegraphic agency dispatch said Wednesday.

## "Norway Day" Officially Set; Bond Sale Planned

"Norway Day" has been officially set for Saturday, November 14, with sale of war bonds and entertainment planned both afternoon and evening. This was the announcement made by Karl Johnson, chairman of the Norway Day celebration.

"At this time when our dear United States is at war against the enemies of mankind, we Americans of Scandinavian descent feel obligated and duty bound to assist this nation along with the other United Nations in building a world where every man, woman and child, has equal opportunity to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Our most effective means of achieving this goal is to do our utmost in promoting the sale of United States war bonds and stamps. We have therefore asked Mayor John Houston to set aside Saturday, November 14, as 'Norway Day' to promote the sale of such bonds," stated Chairman Johnson.

The bond drive will open at 10 a. m. Saturday with a parade. A portable stage is to be erected in the business district. On this stage will appear speakers, bond salesmen, entertainers and musicians, the program to continue throughout the day and to be completed at the armory in the evening. Admission to enter-

tainment at the armory will be the purchase of war stamps, the chairman announced.
