

LARGE SAVING SEEN IF TAX PLAN PASSES

A saving of \$253,606.66 for the property owners of Klamath county school district, Klamath Union high school district, and the local elementary school district, would result from passage of the November 3 ballot measure distributing surplus income tax funds to school districts. It was estimated Friday by officials of the three districts.

An analysis of the effects of the measure, prepared by a member of the Oregon State Teachers' association on the basis of figures supplied by the school districts, follows:

22 Cents a Day

"The Klamath county school district special tax levy would be reduced approximately 71.3 per cent if the bill for distributing surplus income tax funds to school districts is passed by the people at the general election Tuesday, November 3.

"According to Harold Ashley, clerk of the county school board, approximately twenty-two cents for each day actual attendance will be received by the school district if the estimated surplus funds are distributed to the school districts. On the basis of the total daily attendance in the Klamath county school district last year and the estimated income tax surplus, approximately \$148,435.85 will be received by the county school district. The special school district levy for operating expenses and bond and interest expense this year was \$218,156.48. On this basis for the year 1942, it would be necessary to raise little more than \$69,720.66 by a special levy.

Amount Assessed

"In terms of millage levy, it was necessary to levy approximately 11.05 mills on the total Klamath county valuation in the year 1942. On the estimated income from income tax surplus, it would be necessary to levy less than 3.27 mills, a saving to the property taxpayer of approximately 7.78 mills or 71.3 per cent.

"According to Superintendent Arnold Gralapp, school district number one will receive \$85,851.56, and the Klamath Union high district will receive \$39,757.10 making a total saving to these districts of \$105,608.66. In other words, only \$227,492.33 of the 1942 special levy of \$342,100.99 would have had to have been assessed.

Bill Sponsored

"It is estimated by the officials of the three school districts, the Klamath Union high district, the Klamath Falls District No. 1, and the Klamath county school district, that there will be an estimated saving of \$253,606.66 to the property owners in these three districts. In terms of millage levy, the Klamath district No. 1 would cut the levy from 6.2 mills in 1942 to .573 mills for 1943, and the Klamath Union high school district would cut the millage from 18 mills in 1942 to 14.8 mills in 1943 if school costs were to remain the same.

"Bill No. 312-13, "Distributing Surplus Funds to School Districts, Reducing Taxes Therein," is sponsored by the Oregon State Teachers' association and the local chapter of that organization, The Klamath County Teachers' association."

The president asked employers to arrange work schedules so that they and their employees may cast their ballots without loss of pay to workers for reasonable time off.

The president read his formal statement on the elections at a press conference after which reporters asked how he was going to vote.

The president would not say in detail how he was going to mark his ballot, but when asked whether it was a fair inference that he would vote against Representative Fish, republican candidate for reelection in the chief executive's home district, replied in the affirmative and added he had already said so before.

Eventually one of the firemen broke a window, crawled in, awakened Kilborn—and broke the bad news.



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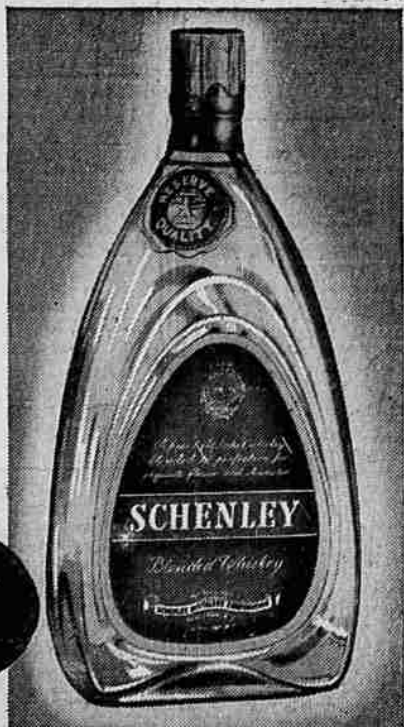

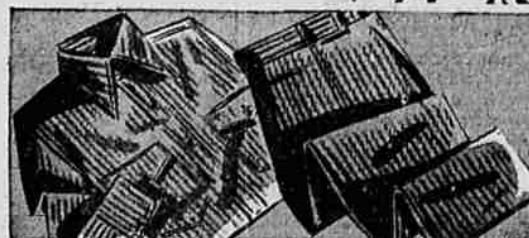
