

Varied Program Presented Monday

Mrs. Frank Payne Guest Speaker Before Garden Group in Library Club Rooms.

The garden group of the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club enjoyed a well rounded program on Monday afternoon of this week when members met in the small club rooms of the library to enjoy the annual fall chrysanthemum show and a talk by Mrs. Frank Payne on "Indian Uses of Native Plants."

A brief business meeting was presided over by Mrs. Frederick W. Hamilton. Mrs. Karl G. Cummings was in charge of the chrysanthemum show and many interesting varieties were displayed.

Mrs. Horace E. Getz spoke of the district meeting in Medford and made an appeal for vases and perennial plants and bulbs to be sent to beautify Camp White, Medford.

It was announced that the club would not meet during November but that there would be an all-day meeting Friday, December eighteenth, when Mrs. Ernest D. Lamb, Mrs. E. M. Chilcote and Mrs. Chesleigh O. Moore would have charge of the making of Christmas wreaths for Camp White.

Mrs. Lamb and Mrs. Roland Oakes gave five-minute talks on "Putting Our Plants to Bed for the Winter."

Mrs. Payne, author of "Captain Jack," spoke to the group in a most interesting manner. Her talk was richly illustrated by specimens from the extensive collection of Indian artifacts Mrs. and Mrs. Payne have gathered over a period of several years, and by beautifully mounted specimens of plants the Indians used, these loaned by Mrs. F. O. Small, member of the club.

Mrs. Payne pointed out how short a time ago there were no stores, lumber mills, nor any forms of transportation except the dugout canoe in the Klamath country, making it necessary for the Indians living here to rely completely upon their own resources and those of nature to provide shelter, clothing, food and tools.

In meeting these needs, she said, they depended greatly upon plants native to this country, chief of which was tule from which they made their houses, utensils of all kinds, and even clothing including hats, capes, skirts, leggings and moccasins.

Sagebrush, bark and nettles were also said to be important to them in many ways. Mrs. Payne explained how they used their fiber in weaving and the manner in which the outer bark of the nettle was twisted into cord for use in making fish nets and other useful articles.

The Wocus, or yellow pond lily, Mrs. Payne remarked, was one of the most important staples in the Indian diet, ranking second only to fish. She told of how the seed was gathered during July and August each year by the squaws who made the rounds of the marshes in dugout canoes and how it was prepared as a food. She also named dozens of other plants whose seeds, roots, bulbs or berries were important to the Klamath menu. The chokecherry was considered a delicacy by the local tribe.

The bride wore a suit of army cloth color with luggage tan accessories and a corsage of white chrysanthemums. Speaker Pictures Work of Students

Soroptimists Volunteer Services To Assist in Mileage Rationing Program

At their meeting in the Pelican party room Thursday noon the members of the Soroptimist club voted one hundred percent to volunteer their services for the vast amount of clerical work that will be required in the recapitulation of the applications of motorists which the government is calling for in connection with mileage rationing.

Mrs. W. W. Southwell was appointed to serve as chairman to arrange a schedule of hours to be worked by each member, so that each evening a few could participate, thus having jobs handed to them.

She later calls on the employer to see how her students are progressing and to aid in ironing out any difficulties or differences that may occur in their adjustment. Mrs. Lewis expressed her appreciation for the cooperative spirit of the employers, stressing the fact that the girls were young and inexperienced and were being sent out faster than they had anti-pated and so were not yet as well trained as she would like, but stating that, due to the urgent need for them, the employers were carrying on the necessary training and thus the girls were learning while working. She welcomed suggestions and asked for the cooperation of the business women in appearing before her classes to give talks, stating that the experiences of their first hand experiences would prove invaluable to her girls.

The speaker of the day brought to the club a picture of the work being done by the young students who are going all-out in their endeavor to fill the vacancies in stores, shops and offices. Mrs. Sally Lewis, vocational coordinator at the Klamath Union high school, told in a capable and entertaining way, about these youngsters who are giving up the extra time, that they might be devoting to extra-curricular activities, to work afternoons and Saturdays, attending their classes only in the forenoon.

Due to the fact that Mrs. Lewis joined the staff late and classes were already organized, not as many students were able to rearrange their course of study to include the vocational program as could have been handled had this course been available when programs were first set up. However, she has a class of twenty-seven and has now placed all but two of these girls, practically all of whom are reported as giving entire satisfaction to their employers, and she stated that the girls were pleased and thrilled with the opportunities thus presented.

The procedure followed by Mrs. Lewis is to make a personal call upon an employer who is requesting help, thus learning directly the type of work to be performed, the duties, the time assistance is required, and the type of person wanted for the place to be filled. She then endeavors to select the proper person for such place but sends two or three girls to apply, in order not only to give the employer a preference, but to establish competition between the girls, which teaches them how to apply for the work rather than
