

• TROUBLE SEEN FOR PACIFIC NW TRANSPORT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP) — The Pacific northwest's transportation system is heading for trouble.

So warned the regional planning commission in a report on trade in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

The commission said the transportation system is dependent upon automobiles, tires and petroleum products, normally about 40 per cent of the region's incoming goods, but now curtailed because of the war.

Imports
"In a region of great distances like the Pacific northwest... wartime shortages will have a constantly increasing effect on the region's trade as gasoline rationing goes into operation and the need for replacement of tires and automobiles becomes more and more pressing," the commission said.

The report listed annual imports at \$413,000,000 of which 61 per cent were manufactured products and the leading three were gasoline, automobiles and fuel oil.

Shipments
The figures were based on a report earlier this year, covering the period from 1934 to 1939. The latest report, termed a supplementary analysis, was prepared as a guide for business men in development of the region's industries.

It listed shipments from the four states at \$536,000,000 annually with lumber, flour and wheat the leading products.

Thus the region had a favorable balance of trade of more than \$120,000,000 annually, but the commission said, "this sum does not measure the net profit of the region, as it must be drawn upon to cover the cost of insurance, debt payments and other invisible items."

CANADA TIGHTENS WARTIME ECONOMY

OTTAWA, Nov. 2 (AP)—Canada's war economy slipped into a higher gear today and most Canadians felt the resulting change as a series of freezing orders and restrictions went into effect with the opening of business.

Perhaps the most sweeping alteration in Canadian business life was contained in the order by the board of prices freezing a variety of business establishments at their present status and forbidding the starting of new businesses except by permit. The creation of new selling outlets, stocking of lines of goods not already handled and moving to larger premises is prohibited except by permit.

The order applies to manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and ten types of service businesses such as undertaking and embalming, laundering, hairdressing and plumbing and heating.

800,000 Yanks Now Overseas, Letter Reveals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP) — Armed forces of the United States overseas now total 800,000 men, it was disclosed Saturday in an exchange of correspondence between General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, and Admiral Ernest J. King, commander in chief of the United States fleets.

The figure was included in a letter written by Marshall extending Navy day congratulations to King.

'Quake Frightens Churchgoers in Spokane Area

SPOKANE, Nov. 2 (AP) — An earthquake, severest of three shocks recorded at Mount St. Michael's scholasticate, rattled windows and frightened churchgoers over a fan-shaped area north and east of Spokane at 11:50 a. m. (PWT) Sunday.

The scholasticate said minor quakes occurred at 8:42 a. m. and 12:16 a. m. The second and heaviest shock was felt as far east as Paradise, Mont., and north into British Columbia.

At Sandpoint and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, congregations hurriedly left several churches. The Northern Pacific railway halted operations temporarily

east of Spokane while crews checked the track for slides.

Price Ceiling To Be Erected on All Construction

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP) — The office of price administration will step into the nation's construction industry next Thursday and erect a price ceiling over all building and repair service-sales jobs.

Drawing its blueprint in terms of prices in existence last March, with slight variations to allow for April, May and June wage increases, OPA plans to set up the specialized ceilings strictly on a by-the-job basis.

OPA said the new regulations will cover all jobs which call for either equipment or materials plus labor, but will not af-

fect cases where only labor is needed.
