FOUR GROUPS RAP PROPOSED TAX DIVERSION

Four Oregon organizations, describing themselves as "taxpayer groups," issued the following statement Monday:

"Statements appearing widely throughout Oregon from school administrators as to large reductions in local school property taxes as result of proposed income tax diversion bill are misleading and give taxpayers a last minute unwarranted expectation of impossible tax reductions. These last minute promises are denounced by Oregon Taxpayers' federation, Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., Multnomah County Taxpayers association and the temporary tax stabilization committee as not presenting a complete statement of probable results from the bill. These reductions in school tax levies up to one hundred per cent fall to take into account, first, that six million surplus is wholly abnormal and schools cannot rely on any such continuing surplus. Second, many school districts cannot reasonably use such large sums as sponsors claim districts will receive. Third, levying of large taxes for state purposes on property when post war period brings increased state expenses will wipe out reductions so glibly promised now by educational groups. Fourth, if sponsors of income tax diversion are so certain of large tax reductions they should in fairness to taxpayers disclaim any intent to levy property taxes on schools original tax base which full levying is permitted to districts by this bill. Fifth, last minute pre-election claims of tax reductions are fantastic and all such promises that ignore inevitable higher state levies if this measure is approved are contrary to public policy and distort the public's understanding of an important bill. Sixth, sponsors who now promise such exorbitant tax savings should also point out that their bill contains no restraint on spending all these surplus dollars by school districts and teacher sponsors know that they have no final control of budgets which is necessary to make good on their present promise of such sweeping tax reductions."
