

# VOLUNTEERS ASKED TO AID IN GAS RATION

A call for volunteer assistants to aid in processing the applications for supplemental gasoline ration books in the coming "mileage rationing" program, was issued today by Mrs. Effie Garcelon, executive secretary of the local War Price and Ration board.

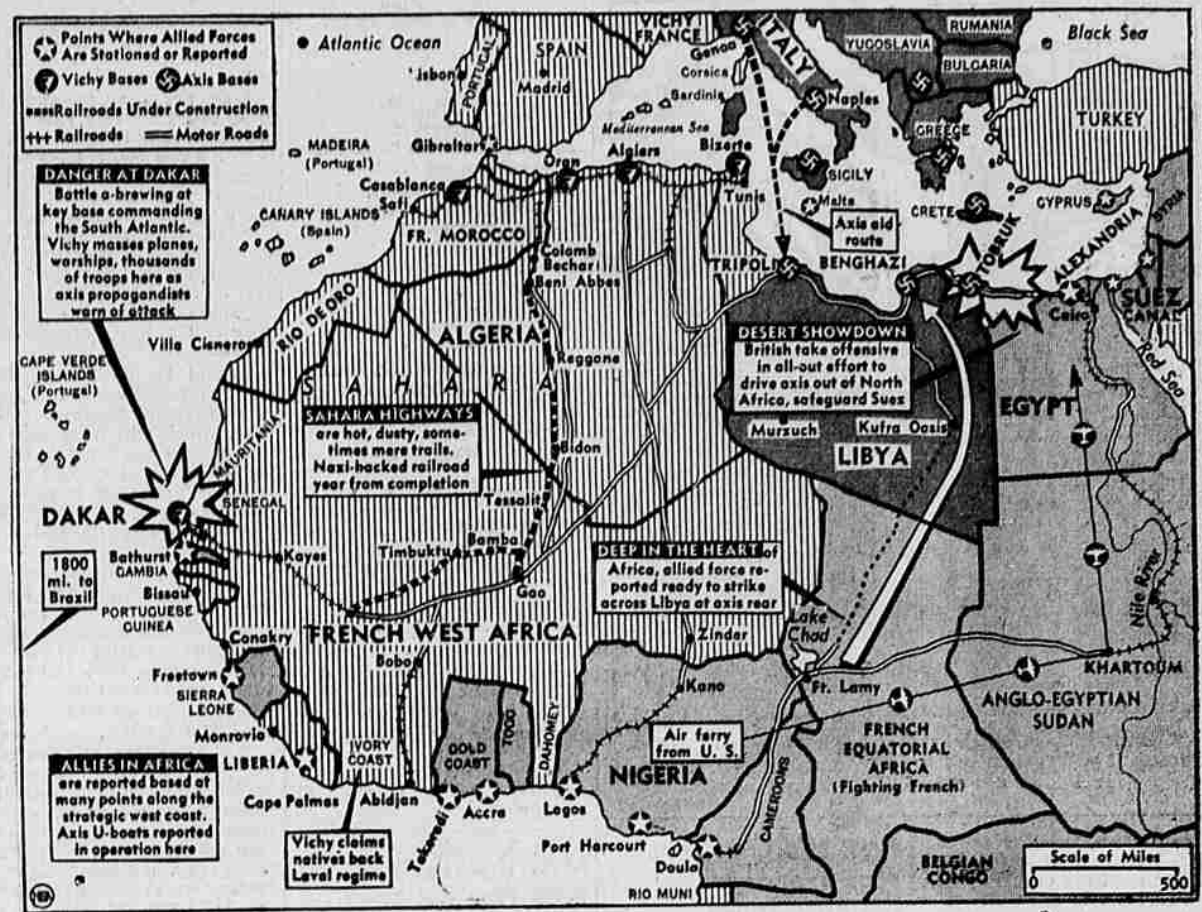
Many assistant workers will be required from November 16 to 28 inclusive, she said. Workers will be needed each day from 9 a. m. to 10 p. m., working in shifts of two to three hours. The work will be to process the supplemental applications for "B" and "C" gasoline ration books, which permit additional motor fuel supplies. Supplemental applications will be filed by motorists who believe the amount of gasoline allowed in the "A" books, available to every car owner, is insufficient for their requirements.

**Basic Registration**  
Volunteers should register at the office of the War Price and Ration board, 434 Main street, or telephone 5322, advising the clerk of the days and hours they are willing to work.

Basic registration for ration books will be handled by schools on November 12, 13, and 14, through the volunteer set-up of teachers, patrons and PTA used in the sugar rationing program. Motorists will present their applications with car registration certificates in person on forms which may be secured from service stations, garages, and the War Price and Ration board here. They will then receive, at the school, an "A" book.

Those who seek supplemental fuel supplies will be given forms at the schools on which they will apply for the "B" or "C" books, which will then be filed at the War Price and Ration offices.

### 3 PLEAD GUILTY AS JAP AGENTS

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—Two Americans and one British subject pleaded guilty Monday in federal court as they were to go to trial on charges of acting as unregistered agents of the Japanese government. Federal Judge Marcus B. Campbell set November 12 for sentencing.

The three are Joseph Hilton Smyth, 40, of Old Lyme, Conn.; Walker Grey Matheson, about 50, of Washington, D. C., and Irvine Harvey Williams, 38, a British subject living in Noroton, Conn. They face possible maximum sentences of 10 years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine.

They admitted having bought and published with Japanese funds a magazine, "The Living Age," which from June, 1938, to August, 1941, published material furnished by the Japanese. The agreement with a Japanese vice consul in New York included adoption of a favorable policy toward the Japanese on all questions, according to the government charge.

Judge Campbell remanded the trio to the federal detention prison in Manhattan to await sentencing. They were arrested September 5 and indicted October 6.

### Lumber Dispute Certified to WLB

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Secretary Perkins has certified to the war labor board an industrial dispute involving 22 lumber companies of the Willamette Valley Lumber and Loggers association, Eugene, Ore., and Columbia river district council No. 5, International Woodworkers of America (CIO).

The dispute, affecting 1500 workers, is over a general wage increase, the secretary announced.

### LONG STAND FOR SOLDIERS

FORT DEVENS, Mass. (AP)—Patriotism gave nine Oklahoma soldiers an unscheduled nine extra hours of furlough.

### TEEN-AGE DRAFT ISSUE HANGS FIRE

#### WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)

Whether teen-age soldiers shall be sent into combat without a year of training and whether women enlisted in the navy and coast guard reserves shall be permitted to serve overseas are among issues facing congress when it resumes regular business next week.

Both senate and house have decreed that 18 and 19-year-old youths may be inducted into the armed forces, but have disagreed over the question of giving them a stipulated period of training before putting them under fire.

The house skirted the training issue by not even voting on it directly, only to have the controversial subject tossed right back in its lap by the senate which, on a close vote, decided no teen-age inductees should be assigned to combat duty until he had at least 12 months of training.
