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ter, but it looked as if the aged democrat would be unable to catch up with Stockman's long lead.

Stockman was ahead in Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Sherman, Umatilla, Wasco and Wheeler counties.

The Pendleton man took an immediate lead in Klamath county as the first returns began coming in, and was never headed by Pierce. He carried many precincts, including several in the suburbs, that have gone democratic for years. His huge vote here was surprising even to his friends, and was a tribute to the quiet but intensive campaign he made in this county, where he had newspaper support.

Decade Ends

If Stockman wins out, as he appeared likely to do, he will remove Pierce after 10 years in which the La Grande man has held the congressional post. Pierce narrowly defeated Charles H. Mack of Klamath county for the democratic nomination.

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to have won reelection, in spite of democratic charges that both are isolationists.

The race in the second district, which includes all of sparsely-settled eastern Oregon, threatened to unseat Rep. Walter M. Pierce, La Grande democrat. Returns from 147 of 433 precincts gave only 5952 votes to Pierce, compared to 11,119 for Lowell Stockman, Pendleton republican farmer.

Ellsworth Ahead

Harris Ellsworth, republican, Roseburg newspaper publisher, had a healthy lead over Edward C. Kelly, Medford attorney and a democrat, in the contest for the new seat in the fourth district (southwest Oregon). Ellsworth had 11,281 votes in 130 of 394 precincts, compared to 6509 for Kelly.

The election of Farrell as secretary of state assures the republicans of complete domination of the board of control. The members will be Governor-elect Snell, who now, as secretary of state, is a member; Farrell, and State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott.

Farrell, in 752 of 1770 precincts, had 63,259 votes to 34,740 for Francis Lambert, democratic Multnomah county treasurer.

Kimsey appeared to hold a safe lead over Clarence F. Hyde, Eugene democrat, in the contest for state labor commissioner. Returns from 767 of 1770 precincts gave Kimsey 52,605 to Hyde's 40,575.

Pay Boosted

The voters appeared to have granted legislators their long-sought pay increase, returns from 753 of 1770 precincts showing 54,470 for the increase and 41,977 against it. The constitutional amendment increases legislators' pay from \$3 a day for 40 days to \$8 a day for 50 days.

The constitutional amendment to prevent the expenditure of motor vehicle taxes for purposes other than road construction and maintenance also appeared to be carrying, 45,322 to 32,983.

The two other measures on which the voters granted their approval are the amendment to abolish the rural credits provision of the constitution, which was carrying 36,712 to 33,506, and the bill to give the schools a slice of the income tax receipts, which was winning approval 46,171 to 37,802.

Tax Defeated

The bill to tax cigarettes two cents a package was being defeated, returns from the same precincts showing 43,121 for it and 46,501 against. The measure to prohibit commercial fishing in coastal streams and bays was losing 37,493 to 50,275.

Results on the constitutional amendment which would permit the legislature to restore voting rights to ex-convicts was almost even, with 37,407 for the amendment and 37,693 against.

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EDITORIALS ON NEWS

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The details of what is happening, who is getting the edge, etc., must wait for another day—or for however many days we have to wait.

You can't hurry the war news.

NOTE the continued Japanese bombings of British and American bases in eastern India, where an allied counter-attack against Burma will be launched if it is launched. These bombings appear to indicate Jap belief that an allied attempt to recover Burma is in the making.

KOKODA, from which today's dispatches report the Japs as having been driven out, is about halfway across the New Guinea peninsula northeastward from Port Moresby, the all-important allied outpost to the north of Australia. It lies at the head of a fairly flat valley reaching up from the beachhead at Buna established by the Japs some months ago.

It was by this route that they sought to take Port Moresby by a land attack, and they actually got within 30-odd miles before being stopped and turned back by Australian troops. They have been in slow retreat ever since.

Your map, if it is a fairly good one, will make the situation clear as to this point.

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ernor since Hiram Johnson in 1914, accused Warren of hiding politics under a cloak of non-partisanship and asserted the republican candidate had obstructed his defense program.

Lieutenant Governor Ellis E. Patterson, democrat, was doing comparatively better than Olson. He was leading his republican opponent, Frederick F. Houser, 223,758 to 216,720 in 4522 precincts.

Kenny Ahead

A democrat, Robert W. Kenny, also was ahead in the race for attorney general to succeed Warren. In 3111 precincts Kenny had 131,843 while Wallace L. Ware, his republican opponent, had 106,126.

A proposal to outlaw "hot cargo" which is a union term for goods in a struck plant to be boycotted by unions in sympathy with the striking workers, although it was running behind in San Francisco.

A proposal to repeal the state income tax also was trailing.

Lieutenant Will Rogers, son of the late humorist, was running behind Representative Leeland M. Ford, republican, in the sixteenth district congressional race.

British Tanks In Collision With Rommel

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marines, supported by a terrific aerial assault, hammered the enemy farther away from the island's prize air field.

Swiftly following up the withdrawal of the Japanese fleet, which was heavily damaged in a sea-air battle Oct. 26, American "devil dog" fighters were reported to have driven Japanese troops back two miles in one sector, while U. S. Flying Fortresses, dive bombers and fighter planes strafed the enemy throughout the area.

Few Casualties

A navy communique said the Japanese retreat began Sunday (Solomon time) when U. S. marines — previously reported outnumbered and hemmed into a corridor six miles long by three miles wide — closed the Matanikau river and advanced to the west.

American casualties, the navy said, were comparatively few.

Coincidentally with the navy's disclosure that U. S. submarines had sunk seven more Japanese ships in the far Pacific, a summary revealed that American forces have now sunk a grand total of 333 enemy ships since Pearl Harbor.
