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drawn to a prepared second line.

Nazi broadcasts insisted, however, that "there can be no talk of a breach of the German-Italian front" by British troops and asserted that despite British superiority in numbers, axis troops were putting up the "fiercest" resistance.

Gen. George von Stumme, Rommel's second in command, was reported killed in action by the British.

Reinforcements Rushed

The British radio hammered the story home to the peoples of Germany, Italy and the conquered countries with broadcast after broadcast in many tongues.

Dispatches from Greece said the Germans were frantically rushing three or four divisions from the Russian front in an attempt to reinforce Rommel's battered legions. Four trainloads of Nazi troops were said to have passed through Athens en route to embarkation points.

Half Tanks Destroyed

Allied fliers told of enemy troops "scattering like cockroaches" as British and American warplanes flew low over the battlefield, bombing and machine-gunning the dazed axis armies.

Dispatches said the Italians had asked for a truce in one sector in order to bury their dead. More than half of Rommel's tanks were reported to have been destroyed in the climactic breakthrough as Lieut.-Gen. B. L. Montgomery's army, bolstered by American-made General Grant and General Lee tanks, rolled back the axis line beyond El Alamein, 80 miles west of Alexandria.

Lumber Freezing Balls Up Bridge Construction

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5 (AP)—Lumber for two small bridges to connect Portland's 33rd avenue with the Vancouver ferry terminal has been frozen twice, unfrozen once and locked up in one jurisdictional labor dispute.

So said Lindstrom Bros., contractors, to the state highway commission today in asking that they be released from the contract.

The commission said delay in the bridge construction is holding up the Sunderland avenue improvement job which, in turn, is delaying installation of bus service to the Ferry terminal. Lack of this bus service is delaying the operation of a second ferry, the board was told.

The commission, however, refused the Lindstrom request and decided to seek further methods to release the lumber which first was frozen by a war board order, then released but almost immediately frozen again. One company prepared to deliver some of it in spite of the freeze but AFL workmen refused to handle it because it had previously been handled by CIO men.

The board received only three bids on eight rock production jobs.

Said Commission Chairman Henry F. Cabell: "This is the first time in all the years I've been on the commission that we haven't had a construction job up for letting. These are all maintenance jobs and now we can't get bids on them. I guess we'll just about have to fold up for the duration."

The board suggested to counties and cities that snow removal equipment be pooled this winter.

Looks Like the Horse-and-Buggy Days Are Back

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 5 (AP)—The days when knowledge of election results was delayed while men on horseback brought in the tallies from scattered precincts appeared to be coming back today in Idaho's gubernatorial race.

With congressional incumbents safely re-elected, Gov. Chase A. Clark, democrat, was leading his republican opponent, former Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen, by only 147 votes with 33 of the state's 843 precincts unreported.

Because of blocked roads in Idaho county and poor telephone facilities in other isolated districts the unofficial returns appeared unlikely to be completed.

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new senate seats without losing one to the democrats, and the latter had lost eight. Independent George W. Norris, Nebraska, also lost out to a republican, Kenneth S. Wherry.

Lone Progressive

With only one senate contest outstanding, that between Senator Murray (D-Mont.) and Wellington D. Rankin, (R), the republicans had gained nine new senate seats without losing one to the democrats, and the latter had lost eight. Independent George W. Norris, Nebraska, also lost out to a republican, Kenneth S. Wherry.

The democrats elected 15,

which with 41 holdovers, gave them a total of 56 in the new senate starting January 3. Republicans elected 18 and with 20 incumbents not up for reelection gave them a total of 38. The senate's lone progressive, LaFollette of Wisconsin, was not up this year.

17 GOP Governors

This democratic majority of 17 or plurality of 18 over the republicans compares with an existing majority of 34 or plurality of 36. Lowest majority in recent years was in 1933 when the division was 59 democrats and 36 republicans. Highest was in 1937 when it was 75 democrats to 17 republicans.

Of the 33 governorships at stake, including that in Maine which elected September 14, the republicans won 17, the democrats 13, and progressives one. Two were still in doubt — in Idaho and Wyoming. Counting holdovers, the democrats now will have at least 23 governors, the republicans 33, and progressives one.

New Deal Losses

Technically of course the democrats retained control of both houses of congress. However, dependable working majorities cannot be counted on by the administration at all times when it is considered that party members do not vote solidly, particularly on domestic questions.

Besides the veteran Norris, the new deal lost in the elections such supporters as Senators Herring of Iowa, Lee of Oklahoma, Brown of Michigan, Smathers of New Jersey, and Schwartz of Wyoming. Other democratic seats won by the republicans were in Delaware, West Virginia and South Dakota.

The reelection of Senator A. B. (Happy) Chandler (D-Ky.) over Richard J. Colbert, republican, had an aftermath in a charge by Dr. O. F. Hume, republican national committee man from Kentucky, that there was "ample evidence of wholesale fraud and corruption" in

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ready-overwhelming lead over Lew Wallace, democrat. The same number of precincts gave Snell 215,950 to 63,247.

Homer D. Angell, republican congress incumbent from the third district, inched ahead of Thomas R. Mahoney, democrat, 54,598 to 50,772. All 443 of the district's precincts had reported. In the first district, James W. Mott topped Earl A. Mott, democrat, 48,827 to 27,021 with 297 of the district's 500 precincts reported.

In the new fourth district, Republican Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg publisher, was far ahead of Edward C. Kelly, democrat, with 377 of 394 precincts in. The count: Ellsworth 29,842, Kelly 18,951.

Robert S. Farrell, Jr., boosted his margin over Francis Lambert, democrat, in the race for the secretary of state office to 167,470 to 94,376 with 1715 precincts reported.

For labor commissioner, W. E. Kimsay, republican, topped Clarence F. Hyde, 132,154 to 114,892. This count was from 1715 precincts also.

There was no appreciable change in the margin by which the seven measures passed or were beaten.

The navy reported the continued American advances in Guadalcanal last night. At the other end of the newly installed enemy vise, east of Henderson airport, recently landed Japanese troops presumably were manipulating for a thrust at the springboard of the American aerial assault on the foe's ships, troops and installations. Last night, however, the navy said "there is nothing to report."
