HEALTH PROGRAM NEARS COMPLETION

The immunization program being carried out in Klamath county schools is rapidly being completed, according to Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, health officer. On Monday Dr. Rozendal visited Altamont schools, both elementary and junior high, where he gave the second shot of diphtheria serum to 80 students.

Second and final shots were given at Shasta school to 58 boys and girls Wednesday, and during the day Dr. Rozendal visited at Bonanza where he gave the first toxoid shots to 35.

A well-child conference for pre-school children and infants will be held Friday at Sprague River, Dr. Rozendal stated. These conferences have been well attended in the county.

Gladiola Bulb Harvest Gives Way to Crops

SALEM, Nov. 5 (AP)—Oregon's gladiola bulb harvest will be considerably less than that of last year because many bulb growers have planted farm crops instead, the state department of agriculture said today.

Bulb growers are having a hard time finding labor to harvest the bulbs, and this year's growing season was unusually short.

Last year 640 acres of Oregon land were planted in gladiola bulbs, but the department could not estimate this year's acreage. The principal bulb areas are Portland, Grants Pass, Eugene and Salem.
