

DEWEY PLEDGES STREAMLINED NY GOVERNMENT

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 (AP)—The republicans prepared today to assume New York's administrative reins with a full grip January 1 with the pledge of Governor Thomas E. Dewey that he would streamline state government.

As late returns yesterday gave Republican Thomas W. Wallace a plurality of 17,449 over incumbent Charles Poletti, democratic and American Labor party candidate, for lieutenant governor, the democrats lost all hope of keeping a hand in the state administration they controlled 20 consecutive years under three democratic governors—Alfred E. Smith, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Herbert H. Lehman.

GOP Success

A Poletti victory would have created a situation similar to that of 1924, when Seymour Lowman, republican, was Smith's lieutenant governor.

In addition to Wallace, Schenectady county district attorney, the other republican candidates for state office were swept to success behind Thomas E. Dewey's plurality of approximately 600,000 in the governorship race. Republicans also control the state legislature.

Mayor La Guardia charged that the democratic state convention that nominated Bennett "was manipulated for the sole purpose" of giving Democratic State Chairman James A. Farley "an opportunity to hit at President Roosevelt."

Myth Exploded

Bennett was supported by Farley at the Brooklyn convention over President Roosevelt's original choice, United States Senator James M. Mead. Bennett campaigned with Mr. Roosevelt's endorsement, however, La Guardia declared:

"Mr. Farley never won a campaign unless he had President Roosevelt at the head of the ticket. That myth is exploded." Asked for comment on La Guardia's statement Farley said "it would be silly to discuss anything the mayor says."

SIX-MONTH-OLD FOUND SUFFOCATED

Here's a Christmas Cake For That Man in Service

Here's a Christmas Tree cake specially designed for you to send to a soldier in the service. It's wrapped in a honey glaze which hardens to seal its flavor, and is topped with a Christmas tree made by snipping long green gumdrops fanwise for leaves, cinnamon sticks for a trunk and red cinnamon drops for decorations.

Soldiers Christmas Cake

Three cups sifted, not-bleached flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 2 teaspoons allspice, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup citron, cut in slivers, 1 cup candied pineapple, cut in small pieces, 1 cup candied cherries, 1 cup seeded raisins, 1 cup currants or seedless raisins, 1 cup chopped dates, 2 cups small gumdrops, 4 egg whites, 1 cup brown sugar, 4 egg yolks, 1 cup soft vitaminized margarine, 1 cup wine or rum, or non-alcoholic rum flavoring. Sift together flour, baking powder and spices; divide in half. Combine fruits and gumdrops. Sift one-half the dry ingredients over the fruit mixture and mix well. Beat egg whites stiff, add 1 cup of the brown sugar gradually and beat to stiff points; set

aside. Beat egg yolks well with remaining 1 cup brown sugar. Add the softened margarine to the egg yolk mixture, and beat until well mixed. Add remaining flour mixture to the eggs and margarine. Do not stir. Then add the wine or rum. Mix slightly. Add the flour whites. Mix until even throughout.

Pour into pans lined with 2 thicknesses of oiled brown paper. Steam cake for one hour. Then place in a moderate oven (325 deg. F) and bake for 3 hours. Cool. Remove from pan. Wrap in cloth wet with wine or rum and age for at least one week. Then glaze with strained honey boiled to 260 deg. F., hard ball stage. Brush over cake. Let harden and wrap in heavy cellophane for packing.
