2ND FIRE DAMAGES LHL LUMBER MILL

CARLTON, Nov. 6 (P) — Officials of the L.H.L. Lumber company estimated today that a fire which destroyed their mill yesterday for the second time in two years did \$75,000 damage.

The fuel shed, planer and boiler room alone were saved. The mill had a monthly capacity of 4,500,000 board feet and employed 125 men. The loss was covered partially by insurance, said E. J. Linke and Guy Haynes, operators.

The mill resumed operations in January of this year after having been destroyed by a blaze July 3, 1940.

Linke and Haynes said they planned to rebuild again if priorities could be obtained to replace lost machinery.

End of Closed Fire Season Proclaimed

PARTY ENDS IN TRAGEDY WHEN CRASH KILLS 3

SEATTLE, Nov. 6 (P) — A party to celebrate the return home of two merchant marine seamen ended in tragedy last night when one of the men and two women, all of Auburn, were killed as their automobile turned over and hurtled into another near the University bridge. Three small children were left motherless.

The victims:
 Mrs. Martin Petrich, 22, mother of Arlene, 6, and DeLores, 4. She drove one of the cars.

Mrs. Charles Wesley Petrich, 21, mother of Milton, 5.
 William C. Wetzel, Jr., 19.

Card Found

The only person to survive in the Petrich automobile was Martin Petrich, 25, who was seriously injured. Thomas Holt Wynia, 20, alone in the other car, escaped with a bumped forehead.

The accident happened at 8:10 p. m., but identification of the dead was not made until after 2 a. m., when Charles Petrich was summoned from Auburn. Mrs. Martin Petrich and Wetzel died in ambulances. A card in Mrs. Martin Petrich's purse from her husband said "I'll sure be glad to get back to you and the kids again . . . You'll have to take a couple of days off so we can be together more . . ."

Too Late

Wynia said the Petrich car "suddenly turned over" as it rounded a corner in front of him.

"I jammed on my brakes. I was too late. The other car was upside down in front of me. We crashed."

Japs in Hawaii To Be Evacuated

HONOLULU, Nov. 6 (AP) — Lieut. Gen. Delos C. Emmons, military commander of Hawaii, said Thursday that plans were being made to evacuate some of Hawaii's 161,000 Japanese to the American mainland.

General Emmons made his announcement at a press conference. He said the evacuations would not be on a mass scale, but rather the resettlement of families. Only a small part of the Japanese population will be concerned in the initial movements, he said.
