

# Regent Reports On State Meeting

### Many DAR Activities Brought Out by Mrs. Dixon at Monday Night Meeting

An interested group of members of Eulalona chapters, Daughters of the American Revolution, gathered in the rooms of the library club Monday evening to hear the report of their regent, Mrs. Z. W. Dixon, on her attendance at the state board meeting held in Portland, October the sixteenth.

One of the chief projects of the Daughters throughout the nation this year is the work in connection with blood plasma banks. Oregon Daughters are pooling their funds to purchase equipment for the use of these blood banks, Mrs. Dixon reported.

It was decided at this board meeting, conducted by Mrs. Lydia Horsfall, state regent, to dispense with all flowers at any conventions held during the duration of the war, and use all funds which would normally have been expended for this purpose in the purchase of war saving stamps and bonds. District meetings usually scheduled will not convene again while the war lasts.

Mrs. Horsfall earnestly besought all members to pause each morning at nine o'clock in the morning for a brief moment of prayer.

An outstanding work undertaken by five Portland chapters is the education and training of an Indian girl as a war nurse. It is hoped that the remainder of the chapters in the state will combine their resources and provide the necessary training enabling another Indian girl to take up this work.

One of the interesting items brought out in the district meeting, according to Mrs. Dixon, was the report on Angel Island.

At this time there are three hundred and fifty people being detained at the island, with nineteen nationalities represented, and the first two children. For the only time in many years the Daughters, who send a Christmas box each year, are asked to send no toys. Toilet articles and the usual materials for fancy work and mending are still being solicited.

In an effort to see just how much scrap is contributed through the efforts of the DAR each member is being asked to keep track of the number of pounds her family contributes wherever this is possible.

Many members in the past have made gifts to the museum at Champoeg, and board members were asked to notify their members that all articles offered to Champoeg must be more than one hundred years old. No article should be donated which cannot be traced back to 1830 at least. Through the efforts of the chapter regents, in bringing it to the attention of their members, it is hoped that before the year is out each DAR will own a flag.

A most interesting contest is being undertaken through the Girl Homemakers department of the organization whereby these girls compete for prizes being offered for the best recipe entered. Any Girl Homemaker may enter two, but not to exceed three, recipes, and after they have passed through the state chairman's hands they will be forwarded to the national.

The prize-winning recipes will be made into a cookbook. Each girl must have tried the recipe she enters. All reports must be in by February the fifteenth.

A sad note was struck at the report that there is only one Real Daughter now surviving. This is Mrs. Gregory. A Real Daughter is one whose own father was a member of those offering service to the country during the Revolutionary war.

Mrs. Dixon reported that Eulalona chapter was doing much the same work as the other Oregon chapters along defense lines, with the many hours of Red Cross work, Ambulance corps work, first aid classes and other projects centered around national defense.

Attendants at the board meeting, and members thru-out the state were pleased to learn that Mrs. Horsfall has been endorsed for the national board.

Following the regent's report an interesting program was put on by Mrs. Lloyd J. Goble, Mrs. William Dawson Foster, Mrs. Claude Davis and Mrs. Robert Odell. Each of these members took as her subject one of the outstanding men in command of the allied forces, Mrs. Goble giving a comprehensive survey of General Douglas MacArthur's career to date. Mrs. Foster made the Russian commander, Timoshenko, very interesting to her listeners. Mrs. Claude Davis told much about the life and disposition of Generalissimo Chiang Kai

Shek, and Mrs. Robert Odell reported on Admiral Nimitz. Following the program, refreshments were served by the hostesses, Mrs. B. E. Hayden, Mrs. E. D. Lamb and Mrs. Thomas Hampton, assisted by Mrs. Harry Goeller. The tea table was gay with sprays of holly, centered by a small silken flag in a little bronze standard.

An event which the chapter is anticipating with considerable interest is the style show to be given in the library club rooms in February under the direction of Mrs. Bert Carl Thomas. At this time many quaint old costumes will be modeled by young girls, members of the DAR families.

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# Club Sponsoring Holiday Project

### Soroptimists Plan Thanksgiving Party Next Week; Election in December

Marilyn Merrick Lewis, regional director of the Northwest Region of Soroptimist clubs, has submitted to her club Regional Project No. 1—Service Men's Christmas.

After discussion of this project at the regular business meeting of the Klamath Falls Soroptimist club at Thursday's luncheon it was unanimously decided to cooperate in every way, and with this in view Mrs. Ruth Bathlyan was appointed by President Coral Sabo to make contacts with all other service clubs in the community and get the work under way.

It is hoped to provide a Christmas package for all men in service stationed in camps in the northwest region, and local Soroptimists expect to provide at least two packages per member. Packages may include such articles as candy, cookies, games, playing cards, fountain pens, shaving kits, sewing kits, soap, stationery, air mail stamps, etc. Mrs. Rita Whisenant volunteered facilities for caring for the packages until time to distribute them and members were asked to leave their packages at Everybody's drug.

It is hoped by the time all clubs have been contacted to have enough packages so that each man, no matter what branch of the service he may be in, stationed in or who checks through this community, may be given a package of Christmas cheer during the holiday season. If any private individuals who have no opportunity to give packages through their own clubs wish to provide one or more packages the Soroptimists invite them to place their gifts at the same point of collection, Everybody's drug.

The club also voted to unearth from their hiding places any unused games and send them to Camp White. These are to be brought to the next meeting and sent in one package to the men in the Medford camp.

On November the twelfth, the Soroptimists will have an evening meeting at which time they will entertain as guests, members of the Venture club of Klamath Falls. An invitation is being extended to the Soroptimist club of Lakeview to participate in this meeting which will be a Thanksgiving party.

Under the direction of Mrs. Alice Lamm, members are given an opportunity at each luncheon to purchase war stamps in their favorite color and style, and every meeting sees an eager group around the stamp table. Mrs. Lamm reported the sale of over thirty dollars at Thursday's meeting.

The club voted to dispense with the meeting of November the twenty-sixth inasmuch as that is Thanksgiving day.

Appointment of a nominating committee was announced with Mrs. Isabelle Brinker serving as chairman, assisted by Mrs. Gertrude Moore and Mrs. Ida Odell. Election will be held at the business meeting in December and of interest to all members is the fact that the new officers, who will take their chairs in January, 1943, will occupy these positions until June, 1944. This extended term of office is necessitated by a change in the Fed-

eration by-laws whereby the fiscal year will start in June instead of January as heretofore. It was deemed best by the American federation to elect for eighteen months rather than have a short term of six months.

Mrs. Jennie Southwell, acting as chairman in securing volunteers to help on the gas rationing board, has asked that all members able to give any time to this project call her and register the hours they can give. Mrs. Effie Garcelon, local secretary of the rationing board, anticipates a volume of work which will make it absolutely necessary to secure volunteer help.

In spite of war and the bombs which have fallen on London the British federation held its annual conference in that city, with a large part of the program being given over to plans for reconstruction. This is to be handled through group action, or the coordination of all business and professional women's organizations throughout the country. Miss Elizabeth Glen Dobie, president of the British federation, gives credit to the American club women for the start of the movement.

The British federation is still working for the correction of what they term "That burning problem," which concerns every British woman during this war and, they claim, one of the most shameful things the government has allowed to slip through, is the unequal compensation of persons injured by war. Women are urged to accept complete responsibility, complete equality in danger, complete equality in all the things they have to do in wartime, and they feel it is shameful that they should still get only a proportion of the amount paid to a man who is injured. A nother thing which British Soroptimists are working for along with American Soroptimists is having women at the Peace table.

Mrs. Rose Poole, who was unable to attend the meeting, sent word that work on the nursery school project is progressing and she hopes to give a full report at the next meeting. In connection with this project the club is looking forward to hearing Miss Griggs in the near future. Miss Griggs has been connected with nursery school work at Medford and the clubs hope to learn much from her that will be helpful in the work they are undertaking.
