

BPW Club Members Hear Talk on Chile

Mrs. Naomi Preston Guest Speaker at Monday Night's Dinner at Willard

"Chile's Position in the Present International Crisis," was keenly interpreted at Monday night's Business and Professional Women's club dinner meeting by Mrs. Naomi Preston, who lived in Chile for five years, teaching in Santiago university. Chile's culture is entirely European, having looked to Europe for all of their culture, Mrs. Preston stated. Seventy-five per cent of the population is of Indian blood, and these people also comprise the lower class. The upper class, or aristocrats, who are usually large land owners, are Spanish. They think it degrading to work, and as a whole Chilean people are naturally lazy, with little initiative. Nevertheless, one of their industries which was much in advance of the U. S. is their plane travel to remote places.

All of South America is Catholic.

Newspapers differ from ours in that the first pages deal only with politics. Gossip and murders are on the last pages in obscure print. The chief exports are minerals, nitrates and copper, and agricultural and mining products. The street car company and the Bell Telephone company are owned by United States concerns. Chileans are very jealous of Argentina and Brazil, feeling that they are receiving more help from the United States. There is a strong German influence throughout the country which has stirred their ire. It will take a great deal of effort on our part to create a friendly feeling between North and South America.
