

GOSS PLEDGES FARMERS' AID IN WAR EFFORT

WENATCHEE, Wash., Nov. 11 (AP)—A. S. Goss, master of the national grange, today pledged the united efforts of the American farmers to a unified war program, in a speech prepared to keynote the opening of the grange's national convention here today.

Simultaneously he warned the American people that "one of the gravest dangers to our democratic form of government lies in the tendency to centralize control."

Return Power

"In time of war," said Goss, former federal land bank commissioner, "considerable centralization is necessary, but every proposal for added grants of power should be examined carefully to determine if they are really necessary."

"The chief object should be to see that all extraordinary powers are returned to local control when the emergency is over, and congress should have the say as to when that time comes."

No Quibbling

The farm problem is no longer a problem of surplus, but "a problem of maintaining ample production," Goss warned.

"For years, due to a lack of a sound marketing system, farmers suffered from the effects of surplus production. Yet, when war came and they were asked to increase production, they did not hesitate; they did not quibble over prices, hours of labor, overtime or guarantees on investment."

Shortage Loans

"They went to work and have produced the two largest crops in history. They met and exceeded almost every goal set for them."

"Unfortunately, however, this cannot be kept up, and unless something is done food production will fall off sharply."

The grange's solution for the food and labor problem, he added, was "a price for farm crops which will enable farmers to pay what labor is worth. Wages and working conditions must be relatively competitive with other opportunities."

C. S. Robertson Leaves To Attend Savings Meeting

C. S. Robertson, president of the First Federal Savings and Loan association of Klamath Falls, left on the Wednesday morning train for Chicago, where he will attend the war conference on housing and savings.

Many Washington national housing officials will be present at the conference.

Because of defense transportation, the meeting will be skeletonized and confined to matters of business only. Robertson will return to Klamath Falls in about 10 or 12 days.
