Oregon's victory over UCLA adds prestige to the forthcoming civil war between Oregon and Oregon State, and contributes zest to the annual controversy that rages hereabouts between the one-time cow collegians and the ex-culture boys from Eugene.

The game will be played at Corvallis November 21. That will be before gas rationing, but Klamath pigskin fans will probably not go in such numbers as in past years. There was just a comparative sprinkling of Klamathites at the UCLA game in Eugene last Saturday, whereas usually homecoming games find quite a parade going over the Willamette pass.

But the local partisans can get just as warm even if they don't go to the game.

Neither last year's Rose Bowl champs nor the Webfoots have much to brag about in this year's record, except, of course, the Oregon upset of UCLA. If Oregon plays against Oregon State as it did against the Ukes, it ought to win. But Oregon hasn't played that way in any other game this year.

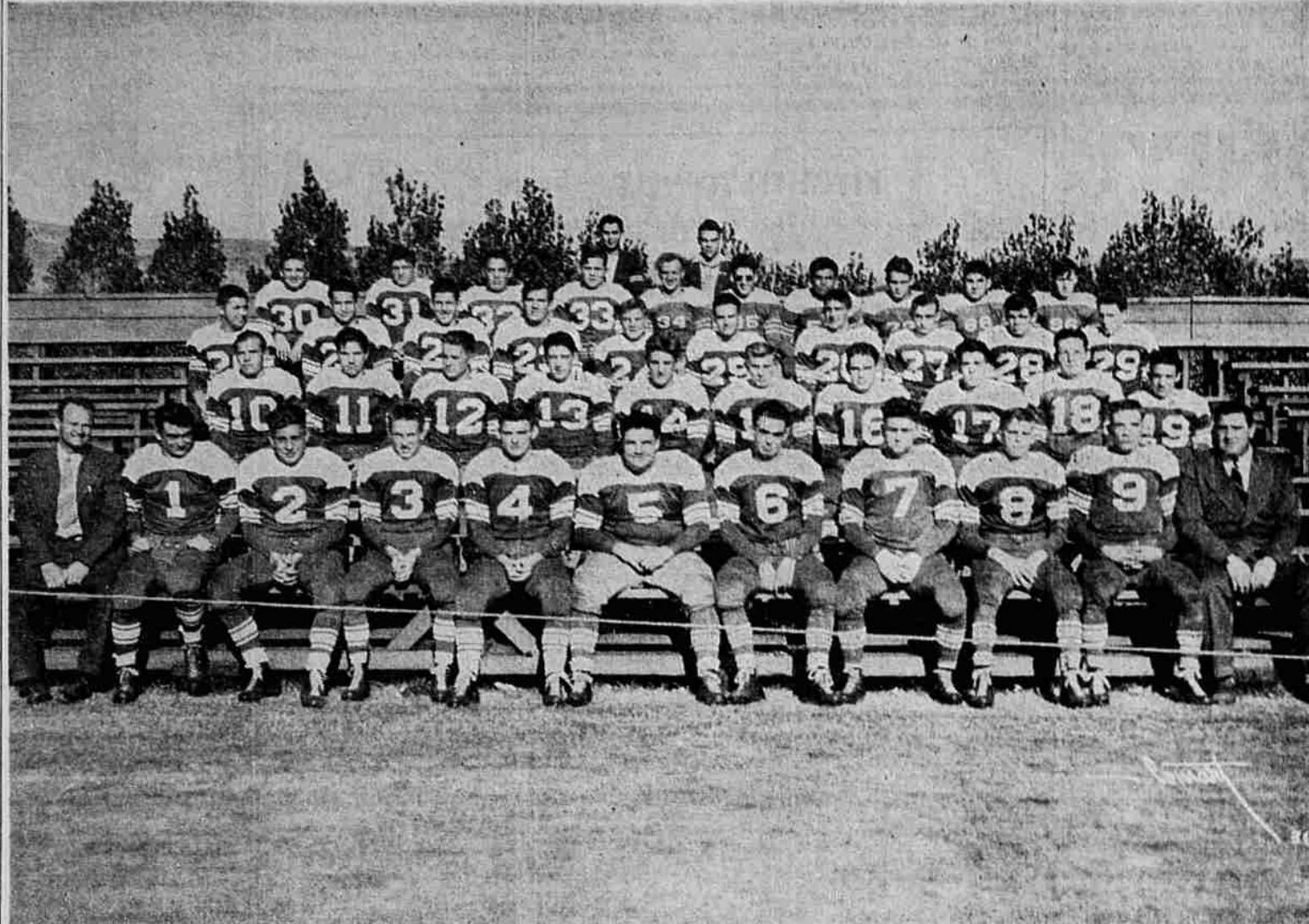
Oregon State smashed Montana handily last weekend, and both teams may be on the upgrade, which promises an interesting afternoon on Bell field November 21.

Practice was concluded yesterday with a long scrimmage in which Tommy Roblin, recently converted to fullback, was a standout. Roblin sparked the Webfoots to their 14-7 upset over UCLA last week.

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 11 (P)—Coach L. B. (Stub) Allison of California didn't go so far as to say he was worried about the Montana game Saturday, but he did indicate today that he would start his first string team.

Despite the fact that Montana reposes comfortably in last place, Allison said Montana's backfield ace, Dick Bowman, justified the precautions.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 11 (P)—Coach Lon Stiner sent the Oregon State Beavers through their last workout of the week today in preparation for the game with Stanford Saturday.

Lava Bears Final Obstacle to Title

Lava Bears, Pelicans Credited With Good Reserves; Expect Tough Battle

In their traditional armistice day game with the Bend Lava Bears at 2:00 p. m. today at Modoc field, the Klamath high school Pelicans face their last obstacle before claiming the state high school football title.

Bend, evidently, is playing a mystery game; for late Wednesday morning there was still no definite word of probable lineups or players:

Portland's Pilots Got Everything

Coast Highest Scorers, Nations Fourth; Average Of 36 1/2 Points Each Game

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 11 (P)—You haven't heard of the Portland Pilots, pal?

Well, here's what they've got:

1. The Pacific coast's highest scorer, fourth in the nation.

2. The hottest college football team in Oregon, in or out of the Pacific coast conference. And an average of 36 1/2 points a game to prove it.

3. A coach who's made their game so pass-heavy it looks like volleyball.

Yes, they really have something this year at University of Portland, a school of the same class as St. Mary's Gaels, Santa Clara's Broncos.

Take Del Huntsinger. He's a good-looking lad from South Bend, Wash., stands six feet, weighs 195. He does the kicking, much of the running, most of the passing and calls signals from fullback.

Portland knew he was good, but just how good wasn't discovered until someone added up his points this week, learning he has scored 11 touchdowns, made 16 conversions—one a drop kick—for a total of 82 points.

That's enough to put him well in front of Washington State's Bob Kennedy, who was listed this week as the coast leader with 63 points. Enough to put him fourth in the national rankings, just ahead of Georgia's Frank Sinkwich, behind Eddie McGovern of Rose Poly, Bob Steuber of Missouri and James Secrest of Rochester.

His running partner and roommate is Halfback Louie Farnsworth of Bellingham. He's scored 50 points himself, mostly on passes from Huntsinger, at least one of which traveled 80 yards through the air.

The Pilots have put their razzle-dazzle together for 219 points this season to opponents' 39. They've won seven out of their last eight games, losing only to the army's star-loaded second air force eleven which has been running roughshod around the west. But even the fliers couldn't keep Portland from scoring twice—something they've taken from no other outfit.

Otherwise, the Pilots' closest call came from Willamette, perennial scourge of the northwest collegiate conference and cradle of Associated Press Little All-Americans. The Pilots won, 34-13.

Whirly Favored To Win Governor Bowie Handicap

BALTIMORE, Nov. 11 (P)—Warren Wright's Whirlaway was a heavy favorite to win his last start of the eastern racing season, the \$10,000-added Governor Bowie handicap which featured the final program of the Pimlico fall meeting today.

Following his engagement in the mile and five furlong Bowie, the Calumet Comet will be shipped to Florida and may not start again this year.

To contest the Governor Bowie, Whirly passed up a chance to even the score with Alsab in Belmont's Victory week sweepstakes for which has been substituted the Victory handicap today. Whirly's trainer, Ben Jones, felt the New York trip would be too arduous.

Whirlaway has already appeared on five relief cards.

COLLEGE PARK, Md.—Center Bill Byrd of the Old Liners at 203, is 50 pounds heavier than his father, President H. C. Byrd, when the president of University of Maryland was a shining light in football 35 years ago.

It is assumed that the Bears starting team will consist of the same backfield combination used in the Salem game last week. Namely, Helmer Wallen, left half; Bob Jeppert, right half; Phil Brogan, full back, and Corin Weber, quarterback. The anchor man in the line is Gene Gillis, 210 pound left tackle.

The Klamath starting lineup is set at the same as used in the Grants Pass game. The line: Coddington, left end; Patzke, left tackle; Clement, left guard; Blohm, center; Watson, right guard; Yancey, right tackle; Mayfield, right end. The backfield: Selby, quarterback; Foster, left half; Vallancour, right half, and Mast, fullback.

Both teams are credited with good reserves. Bend has two teams of nearly equal strength, and the Pelicans have probably the best high school reserves in the state, 184 pounds per man to 175; but both backfields are even at 165 pounds per man.

Last night's practice consisted mainly of chalk talks to allow the boys to rest for what could easily be one of the toughest games of the season.

Rookie of Year Goes To Dudley

Pittsburgh Back Making Strong Bid for Honors

CHICAGO, Nov. 11 (P)—Bill Dudley, Pittsburgh Steeler back, continues to strengthen his bid for rookie of the year honors in the National Football league. The circuit's leading ball carrier now has gained 551 yards, the most efficient job of ground gaining since Bill Osmanski of Chicago's Bears carried off honors in 1939 with 699 yards.

Pug Manders of Brooklyn won the title last year with 466 yards while Whizzer White, then with Detroit, was champion in 1940 with 515 yards.

Sammy Baugh of Washington has joined Green Bay's Don Hutson and Cecil Isbell in the record breaking business. In completing 14 of 20 passes last week, Baugh maintained his lead over Isbell in forward passing and also established a league record in touchdown passes when three of his throws went for scores. He now has a total of 53, two more than the old mark set by Arnie Herber of Green Bay in nine seasons. Isbell, with 52 touchdowns passes, also has broken the record.

There was no one close to Hutson, the ace pass receiver, who broke another of his own records Sunday by boosting his gains from passes during a season to 915 yards. Hutson has caught 47 passes, more than double that of his nearest challenger, and 13 of them have been for touchdowns.
