

6 MORE ORDERED FROM WEST ZONE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11 (AP)—Six more men, including a former German consulate attaché here, have been ordered out of the western military zone as dangerous or potentially dangerous to America's war effort.

Hans Friedrich Benhard, commercial attaché to the Nazi consulate at the time Fritz Wiedemann was consul general, was among those the army ordered excluded. Benhard resigned his post shortly before America entered the war.

The others were: Paul Franz Ludwig Slevens, San Francisco; Albrecht Rudolph Curt Reuter, Beverly Hills, Calif.; Herman Eberhardt, Ocean Park, Wash.; Heinrich Willy Carstens, Seattle, and Rudolph Dahm, Seattle.

Dahm, 41, and Carstens, 30, were foremen in the Boeing Aircraft plant at Seattle, the former having been employed there for 12 years and the latter for 13.

German born but naturalized citizens, the two men were said to appear stunned by the exclusion order. Dahm admitted having belonged several years ago to the German-American Bund, "but when I found out what it was, I got out quick, by gosh." Carstens said he never had been a bundist.

WLB GETS THREE LABOR DISPUTES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—Secretary Perkins has certified these disputes to the war labor board:

Pelican Bay Lumber company, Klamath Falls, Ore., and the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) involving 500 workers in a dispute over wages.

Weyerhaeuser Timber company, Klamath Falls, and International Association of Machinists (AFL), involving 106 workers in a dispute over wages.

Puget Sound Shipbuilding company, Olympia, a jurisdictional dispute involving the Building Trades council (AFL), the Metal Trade council (AFL), and Industrial union local No. 1273 (CIO), and 20 workers.

Local IWA officials said Tuesday that the IWA had asked of Pelican Bay exactly the same wage conditions recently asked of members of the Pine Industrial Relations committee, and that the Pelican Bay dispute was certified separately because Pelican Bay is not a member of the PIRC.

The IWA is asking 95 cents and hour minimum, 12 1/2 cents increase for skilled labor, 50 cents night shift differential, and that the same wages be paid male and female workers.

PORTLAND HOPES FOR MORE MEAT

PORTLAND, Nov. 11 (AP)—Portland hopes increased today that the meat supply would hold up the rest of the year.

Small meat packers have

claimed the office of price administration quotas are too small for the city, and that meat will become scarce if they have to close shop.

Guy R. Kinsley, an investigator from the regional food rationing office in San Francisco, said however that localities with a surplus of meat might be found, and they could ship meat here.

He also suggested that a quota revision was possible, since a strike last November cut down the city's meat production. OPA quotas are based partially on last November, and if it can be proved that production was below normal then an increased quota is in prospect.

War Opens New Field to Fertile Southern Oregon Acres---Growing of Seed

Harvesting in the Klamath basin this fall has not been confined to extra fine baking potatoes and sacks of golden grain.

The war in Europe opened a new field in the fertile acres of southern Oregon and last week more than 120,000 pounds of spinach and radish seed left for out of state markets.

Geary brothers, operating on the Lakeshore road of Upper Klamath lake, shipped one carload of seeds to Minneapolis, another south. A portion of these shipments go on the lend-lease side of the ledger to Russia, China and England.

Four carloads, or more than 200,000 pounds of sugar beet seed, were shipped immediately after harvest by the Gearys, bound for Iowa's mid-west sugar beet fields. During the last war, growers here observed, all sugar beet seed came to this country from Germany, Poland and Russia. When the going was rough, the seed found its way to the United States by way of Siberia as the German and Polish markets ceased shipment.

Sugar beet seed, a two-year crop, has been grown for the past three years by Geary brothers. At the present time there are some 300 acres devoted to this venture. George Stevenson

of Olene has 50 acres of the seed to be harvested next year. There is also a 100-acre planting on the lower lake.

It is probable that sugar beet seed raising will never become one of the major industries of the basin in view of the amount of hand labor involved. The first year a beet is in the ground, it grows about "thumb size." The plant freezes down and the second year matures and develops seed stock.

As for radishes and spinach, one is a new crop to this country. Spinach seed has come from Holland for many years. Radishes have been grown locally for quite some time. Some 500 acres of radish and spinach are now under cultivation in this area by Geary brothers, Jerry Short, George Stevenson and Roy Whitlatch.
