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Ramsey's Dream Team

WHAT is it that has given Klamath Union high school a great football team this year?

We put the question straight to Frank Ramsey, the high school coach, after Wednesday's defeat of Bend, and we believe the interview is worth quoting in full on this day when we salute a great ball club in this column.

Here is what Mr. Ramsey said:

"This gang is one that you dream about."

"All the credit goes to these kids. They're tops. I've never seen anything like it."

"There are no stars. Everybody wants everybody else to look good. I've had first stringers urging me to give the 37th and 38th men on the squad a chance to show their stuff."

"I've had no disciplinary problems—no trouble with training. I haven't had a single rumor come my way that would lead me to question the attitude of any boy on the squad."

That seems to tell the story, and there is nothing much more to add.

A pleasing situation, from the standpoint of the boys on Ramsey's squad, is that large numbers of them have gotten into the games that have been played this season. The glory can be widely spread among some 35 or 40 Klamath boys, and there is enough of it to spread it thick.

This town may seem to be a little football-crazy this year, but it is understandable.

How Censorship Works

TROOPS
(Third of a series)

The voluntary censorship Code requests that there be no unauthorized disclosure of the size, location, movements, or weapons of our fighting forces.

Newspapers and broadcasters naturally learn a great deal about troop movements and the identity of regiments overseas. The reasons for withholding this news are, in the main, obvious. No one wants to tell the enemy that certain troop transports are on the high seas, or to advise him that tank or air force units are being concentrated at a certain point.

Enemy spies like to report exactly what fighting men are where and what equipment they have.

At first thought it might seem harmless to say that Willie Jones was with the Nth Field Artillery in Australia. But by picking up such items here and there an enemy agent could piece together the whole story of General MacArthur's manpower, his equipment, and what special training his troops have had.

Anyone having this information could make a good guess how the troops would be used, and how strong a force would be needed to defeat them.

Many farmers tell me the labor situation is such that next year they will only put in as much crops as their family can handle. Dairymen are either quitting or curtailing production.

This exorbitant labor cost will benefit few. Those getting very high wages will be broke and on relief when it is all over. That happened after World War I.

We of the medical profession, doctors, dentists, druggists, nurses and veterinarians dare not get out and get those big wages war workers are getting. We would be called slackers and say we were unpatriotic.

Let me suggest something. Put all able-bodied men above 40 on the same basis as a soldier. Have no strikes without first arbitration. Put them all at work. Put no man above 40 in the army as a common soldier.

Draft all able-bodied, unenumbered women from 18 to 35 for necessary work. Yes, and give them men's wages.

There are a lot of "screws loose" somewhere.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11—While our soldiers were plunging into Africa to bring the peaceful post-war world closer, Mr. Wallace, the vice-president, made a speech suggesting some new thoughts about what it should be. He delivered his thoughts to an audience celebrating the anniversary of the red revolution in Russia.

Mr. Wallace is a lover of humanity, but somehow he never seems able to get the same love out of humanity that he gives it. He talked like Russia and the United States will have the same ideals, will both have the same kind of democracies after the war.

But to get us together he had to give a new definition of democracy. He implied any government devoted to the common man was a democracy, although sometimes it had to be run by one man. If that is the definition of democracy, it is not our kind of democracy, but dictatorship, in one of its Fascist, Communal or Socialist forms.

Both Hitler and Mussolini, and no doubt Tojo, all operate on the self-assumption that their one-man rule is for the common man of their countries. Every oligarchy in the history of the world justified itself on that pretense.

Our kind of democracy, however, is rule by the common man, not rule by the common man by one man or a group of men. Governments are chosen by free election.

A NEW THING

Mr. Wallace described a new thing he called "ethnic democracy," as the point to which both Russia and the United States are progressing. Mr. Webster's first definition for ethnic is:

"Pertaining to the Gentiles, not converted to Christianity; heathen, pagan; opposed to both Jewish or Christian."

I know Mr. Wallace did not mean that. He used the word for its second definition:

"Relating to community of physical and mental traits in races, or designating groups of races of mankind, discriminated on the basis of common customs and characters."

That is a fine idea, but "a community of races" is a mutual affair. It cannot be one-sided. A friendship or a love of humanity, which is one-sided, is an arrangement in which one party is a fool.

SUBSTANCE IS LACKING

Stalin sent no congratulations to Mr. Roosevelt praising him on the ideals of our democracy last July 4, on our Independence Day, Stalin's second man, Molotov, made no speech in Moscow, lauding the democratic ideals of George Washington, or our constitutional freedom, or the Atlantic charter, or saying how close he was getting to our ways.

Obviously, Mr. Wallace's pretty picture lacks substance. It is not founded on obvious facts.

If the new International Bank, and the International T.V.A. he recommends, are to be founded on the same basis, they will be just as one-sided—at our expense, with the use of our money.

The way Russia has fought this war will never be forgotten. No one has surpassed her in valor in all history.

But, the post-war world must be erected on concrete foundations, not by blurring over the facts. The work must be done on the basis of mutual acceptance, if it is to last. It must be genuine.

ODDS AGAINST WILKIE

Joseph Martin quit as republican national chairman because he was tired of the struggle. He felt he had been let down financially. He could not raise enough money to do a good job, and apparently he blamed the struggle within the National committee between the Wilkie and anti-Wilkie forces for that unhealthy state of affairs.

A recent canvass inside the national committee indicated Wilkie could poll a maximum of 25 votes, not enough to dominate, but enough to be an important influence. His candidate for the chairmanship is supposed to be young Kenneth Bradley, of Connecticut, sponsor of Clare Booth-Luce.

Likeliest successor to Martin in Washington eyes, however, is Werner Schoeder, lawyer, life insurance director and business man of Chicago.

Last year Martin smoothed over the inner conflict between these forces by remaining on as chairman. Now there will be a fight to a showdown with the odds against Wilkie.

TEEN-DRAFT ASKED

The teen-age draft went through because no sensible legislator could take the responsibility of standing against what the army insisted was necessary.

No one has been accused more of being anti-Roosevelt, isolationist and republican, than Dewey Short, of Missouri, who was a member of the final house-senate conference committee. What the army demanded, however, he voted for.

We need workers! The demand has been so great that the Red Cross store rooms are depleted—not only our local store room but all over the nation—and we must have sewing and knitted garments. We realize that the women of Klamath Falls are engaged in a great many other activities, but furnishing these garments is as much a part of our war effort as making planes and ships. The total of hours worked in our local organization in July was 10,338. In August the total hours were 11,251. In October there were only 3603 hours worked. We sincerely thank the units that have worked so faithfully, but we need many, many more hands if we are to fill our quota by December 31. We have not failed on a quota yet and hope we will not this time.

The Junior Red Cross annual enrollment is being carried on this month. Now completing its 25th year of service, Junior Red Cross is the largest non-political youth organization in the world. The present membership is more than 14,000,000 boys and girls. American youth, through the Junior Red Cross, has already made substantial contributions to the war effort. These include 3,000,000 comfort and recreational articles for the armed forces, hundreds of thousands of articles for civilian defense, and more than 500,000 garments for foreign refugees. WINTER LAYOFF OF LOGGERS OUT FOR DURATION

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12 (AP)—By war manpower commission edict, the traditional winter layoff of loggers in snowbound lumbering areas is over at least for as long as the war lasts.

WMC's regional office said that, to obtain maximum use of the loggers' special skills, these men are being shifted to localities where operations are not interrupted by seasonal weather conditions.

Operations Closed

Specifically, in this section of the country, the loggers will be drawn from camps in the Pacific northwest states, Idaho, Montana and northern California and assigned to temporary work elsewhere.

Already, WMC said, many woods operations in the mountain and plateau sections of the northwest have been or soon will be suspended for the season.

Clearance Arranged

Previous order from the commission, designed to stabilize employment in the lumber industry, prevents its workers, even though temporarily idle, from taking other types of jobs.

WMC field agents have been instructed to determine the number of loggers to be transferred and their destinations. To facilitate the movement, employment clearance arrangements were enlarged to include Klamath Falls, Medford, Bend, Eugene, Marshfield and Roseburg, Oregon; and Alturas, Dunsmuir, Eureka, Quincy, Susanville and Redding, California.

The number of loggers available for transfer from the Klamath district is expected to fall below previous years, it was said here, since many local loggers are planning to run at full capacity during the winter, where-ever possible.

However, persons laid off for seasonal closings are asked to contact the United States employment service at once, to find openings elsewhere.

Such workers, according to the USES, will be expected to return to their former jobs when they re-open in the spring.

CAP TO OPERATE AIRPORT WEEKLY

At a recent meeting of the executive officers of the civil air patrol, Lewis Soukup, airport manager, stated that in cooperation with the unit, he would be willing to open the airport on Saturdays for civil air patrol activities. Members of the CAP will operate the field exclusively on that day of each week, furnishing their own ground and air forces, and getting in some operating experience.

Unit Commander Robert Fulton is enthusiastic over the possibilities, and asks that every member of the CAP and anyone interested in enlisting attend a meeting to be held Friday evening, November 13, at 7:30 in the armory.

Fulton recently received advice from wing headquarters that young men between the ages of 16 and 18 years are eligible to join the junior cadets, a branch of the civil air patrol, upon written consent of their parents. Also, men on active duty with the civil air patrol are eligible for commissions in CAP and deferment.

Membership is open to all persons interested in aviation between the ages of 16 and 65. Enlistments are being taken at the chamber of commerce between noon and 5 p.m. daily.
